Grounded in living faith, receiving diversity as a gift, we seek to reflect Christ's light in God's world.

Continually discerning God's vision of grace and peace, we share inspirational worship, spiritual nurture, compassionate service to others, and the pursuit of justice—all to the glory of God.

A Minute in Ministry

With fresh memories in mind of our community Ash Wednesday service, I'm considering what it means to take on a spiritual discipline. For many people, the word "discipline" means committing oneself to an act for the sake of penance: practices such as increased prayer, periods of fasting, or refraining from a pleasurable activity. Clearly, those practices have deep spiritual meaning and value for many people. Over time, I've come to think of engaging a discipline as paying intentional and concerted attention, a practice as applicable to spiritual maturation as to any other art. As dancers practice for hours each day, paying attention to the work of building strength, agility, Endurance, and refinement of movement, while scientists repeat painstaking experiments many times to clarify and certify results, and new readers cultivate skills of eye/brain co-ordination, letter recognition, phonetics, and deductive reasoning, so Christians pay intentional and concerted attention to something. This Lent, I intend to direct my attention to the wisdom of others, especially insights that have remained with me, but which deserve deeper reflection.

An NPR story brought my friend, Curt, to mind. The reporter interviewed a woman who was using theatre as a vehicle for self-awareness and healing with people who are incarcerated. Growing out of his love and knowledge of Shakespeare and his desire to do justice, Curt had pioneered a similar program some years before, called Shakespeare Behind Bars. Curt found that as prisoners immersed themselves in the characters of Shakespeare's plays, the experience was no less than transforming. They gained insight into their own histories and subsequent actions, as well as the capacity to see themselves as more than prisoners: as people with strength of character, compassion and hope for their lives, even if in prison.

I told Curt about the feature, and expressed regret that he had not been interviewed, since he had pioneered the work. He smiled serenely and said, "She hasn't taken anything from me. I just give it all away." That very brief conversation happened several years ago, and I'm still thinking about his response. I remember the look of serenity in his eyes. His open-handedness seemed to have set him free. His generosity made a difference in me.

Since independence was a necessary trait in my early life, I had to learn, quite intentionally, to allow myself to admit need. Of course, life, loss, and brokenness also have a way of cracking the American illusion of the rugged individual. As I've matured, I've become quite able to ask for help, and far better at discerning of whom it is safe to ask help. Now, admitting need, whether material, functional, or emotional, is rarely difficult, although sometimes I still have a hard time figuring out what I need. Now, recognizing that all of us have legitimate needs, I wonder what it means to "give it all away"? For a disciple of Christ's, what is the balance between having a healthy self-respect, acknowledging that we all have legitimate needs for material sustenance, creativity, work, love..... and simply being grasping: having too strong a need for things, recognition, ownership, love, control, or security?

I don't know the answers to my own questions. However, I have observed some things that will inform my mulling over what it means to "give it all away". Over the course of 36 years of pastoral ministry, keeping vigil at the deaths of many of God's children, I know that what counts in life is the quality of human relationships, even if brief, late in coming, and sometimes, very unlikely. I note that relationships anchored in genuine love are most difficult for those who have hidden themselves, perhaps out of fear, old wounds, shame, or "rugged individualism." I note the life-giving freedom my friend's generosity seemed to give him and conferred on me. I experience that people who are honest about their humanity, and all that entails, including how hard it is to give it all away, free the honestly human in others. There's a freedom, a grace and lack of judgment about them that is liberating. I invite you to join me, intentionally paying attention to something that has been asking for your attention for some time now, welcoming God's wisdom, and not just in Lent.

WORSHIP DURING HOLY WEEK

PALM SUNDAY-MARCH 20

Our observance of Holy Week will begin with other churches from around Bronson Park at 10:00 a.m. with the "Blessing of the Palms". Due to expected cold weather, we will gather in our Sanctuary this year! As Jesus paraded into Jerusalem amid cultural and political powers of his day, so we will gather together with other churches to share the blessing of the palms, scripture reading, and a short litany for the day. Following this very brief time together, we will proceed into our respective sanctuaries for Worship.

MAUNDY THURSDAY-MARCH 24

On Maundy Thursday we remember Jesus' commandment to love, in the face of his impending arrest and crucifixion. Our worship, beginning at 7:00 p.m., will relate the narrative events of the first Maundy Thursday as told in the gospels of John and Luke, in a Tenebrae rhythm of scripture readings, interpretive reflection, hymns, and dimming lights. This service will include the sacrament of holy communion, and participation by our Choir.

GOOD FRIDAY-MARCH 25

On Good Friday we will gather to worship in a quiet, more contemplative mode, remembering the ancient story of Jesus' crucifixion. The service will begin at 7:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary, with our neighbors from North Presbyterian Church invited to share worship with us.

EASTER-MARCH 27

Our Holy Week worship will conclude with our celebration of the Resurrection of Christ during our regular service at 10:30 a.m. on Easter morning. Our worship will include communion, special musical brass accompaniment, and, of course, floral decoration of our sanctuary as a beautiful expression of the life abundant we share in God's love. We are grateful to the Chancel Guild for their loving preparation of our Sanctuary.

January, 2016

- to move the date of the March Session meeting from March 16 to March 30.

ENDOWMENT COMMITTEE NOTES

The Endowment Fund supports many functions of our church. Most people think of endowments as providing for the future, and this is indeed a primary objective of FPC's Endowment Fund. That was and still is the clear intention of those who have contributed to this fund over the years.

But each new year is a part of our future. It is anticipated that during 2016 the Endowment Fund will transfer approximately \$116,000 to the general operation of our church and an additional \$15,000 to the Capital Improvement Fund. These amounts do not even include another potential \$50,000 that is available to Session committees to further the mission of your church. These activities include events such as the current Briner Lectureship featuring Marilyn Chandler McEntyre, Ph.D.

Through such distributions, the Endowment Fund plays a vital role in the life of the church today, tomorrow, and beyond. Please consider supporting the Endowment Fund through your contributions and estate planning.

FPC SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS

Scholarship funds are available for active church members preparing for college. The money has been provided by bequests from generous donors from the past, and is now held in Endowed Funds. These bequests include the Edith Eicher Fund, the Grace Pond Fund, the Bernadine Cain Fund, the John Dunning Memorial Fund, and the Conner Education Fund (set up in 1996 in honor of Wayne Conner).

Application forms may be obtained from the Scholarship Committee. The Committee will review all applications and make recommendations to Session.

BRINER LECTURER for 2016 Marilyn Chandler McEntyre, Ph.D.

From March 13 through 15, our congregation will host a series of events with Dr. Marilyn Chandler McEntyre, our Briner Lecturer for 2016. Dr. McEntyre is a writer and professor of medical humanities at the UC Berkeley-UCSF Joint Medical Program who leads retreats and writing workshops. She cares about connecting spirituality, politics, food, healthcare, care for the earth and its creatures, care for language and public discourse, and finding new ways to live together on a planet that needs healing.

Her writing has appeared in *The Christian Century, Weavings, Sojourners, Prism, Conversations, Christianity Today, Academic Medicine, Medical Humanities, Literature and Medicine*, and a variety of other academic and trade publications. Her most recent book, *A Faithful Farewell*, was published in spring, 2015. She earned her B.A. at Pomona College, her M.A. at U.C. Davis, and her Ph.D. in Comparative Literature at Princeton University. She has taught at Princeton University, the College of New Jersey, Mills College, Dominican University, and Westmont College, and now teaches at the UCSF/UC Berkeley Joint Medical Program. 
- <u>10:30 Worship</u>: Dr. McEntyre will preach at our regular morning worship service. There will be an opportunity to engage in further conversation and education at noon.

Sunday evening, March 13 – Tuesday morning, March 15

A series of sessions for clergy, congregational leaders, and interested others, centering on the language of faith and our words for God, entitled "Talking the Talk: Beyond and Behind Christian Clichés".

From a course description: "This course will focus on Christian, denominational, and congregational discourses, and how the ways we speak of and address God, the Bible translations we choose, the words we import from other faith traditions, and our relationship to historic churches imbedded in class systems and their language cultures, shape our practice of faith."

- The first session is on Sunday evening (6:30–8:30). There are three sessions on Monday (9:30–11:30, 1:30–3:30, 6:30–8:30), and one session on Tuesday morning (9:30–11:30).
- Participant fee for these five sessions, including lunch on Monday and refreshments throughout, is \$100.

Eco-Palms

They took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is the One who comes in the name of the Lord — the King of Israel!" — John 12:12-13

To celebrate Palm Sunday, our congregation will partner with the Presbyterian Hunger Program to use Eco-Palms — branches truly worthy of celebration.

Eco-Palm harvesters gather only quality palm fronds in a way that allows the plant to keep growing. The communities process and package the palms instead of selling to middlemen, allowing them to capture more of the profits. With this money, impoverished harvesters are able to buy shoes and school uniforms for their children and can pay for basic healthcare.

Five cents of every Eco-Palm sold for Palm Sunday directly funds projects that improve the lives of all community members. This money provides scholarships for students, pays a teacher's salary, and supports elderly members of the community.

This year, we share the jubilation of Palm Sunday with the people who harvested our palms. As we wave our palms, we can truly say, "Hosanna in the Highest!" For more information, visit www.pcusa.org/palms or speak with Pat Stromsta, Director of Christian Education.

CHOOSING OUR STORIES -YOUTH ENRICHMENT

Middle School through High School

This class series is based on the idea that our lives are built around the stories we hear and, more significantly, the ones we remember. We will draw from several of Marcus Borg's texts, including *The Heart of Christianity*, *Speaking Christian*, and also *Convictions: How I Learned What Matters Most.*

Informal and potentially theatrical conversations will be held weekly, running in sync with the All-Church Lenten Study of Marcus Borg's book, *Convictions*.



2016 Tree Seedlings

The Green Presbyterians (Green P's) is a church committee which works to increase our congregation's awareness of the environment and ways to take care of it. Every spring, tree seedlings are available through the Kalamazoo Conservation District.

This year, the committee will make the seedlings more easily available for members. Choose from evergreen and deciduous tree and shrub seedlings. These can be used for reforestation, for windbreaks, erosion control, wildlife habitat and food, and landscaping. The trees trap carbon in their wood and release oxygen into the air as part of their growth and metabolism.

Seedlings will be ordered by Sunday, March 13, and available for pick up at church on Sunday, April 24.

Lowering Carbon Dioxide (CO2) Emissions from Cars

Did you know that in 2014 an estimated 28% of the total U.S. energy-related CO_2 releases were from motor gasoline and diesel fuel consumption for transportation? We need to reduce CO_2 emissions from cars to slow global warming. Burning a gallon of E10 gasoline emits about 19 pounds of CO_2 (for B20 diesel, about 22 pounds). For more detail, go to www.eia.gov, and search "greenhouse affect climate" and " CO_2 per gallon".

To reduce your car's CO₂ emissions, reduce the number of gallons of fuel burned; e.g., by

A. driving fewer miles, and/or

B. maximizing miles per gallon (mpg) while driving.

As to the latter, here are a few suggestions:

- 1. Cruising in top gear at slower speeds normally increases mpg. For example, in the 50-80 mph range, a rough estimate of mpg vs. speed assumes mpg x mph = a constant. If at 70 mph your car averages 30 mpg (70x30 = 2100), at 50 mph expect about 2100/50 = 42 mpg, about 35 mpg at 60 mph, and about 26 mpg at 80 mph.
- 2. Hypermiling techniques may be a tempting way to substantially boost mpg. But some should be avoided as dangerous or even illegal (e.g. closely tailgating, or "drafting", a semi).
- 3. A stopped car with engine idling obviously gets zero mpg. A typical fuel-injected car, when started, can immediately be driven away (preferably gently for the first mile or so on a cold winter morning), its engine more quickly warming up while driving.
- 4. The starter systems in hybrid cars are designed to withstand restarting the engine after every red traffic light stop; the starter motor in your non-hybrid car may not be. In the latter, idling a warm, fuel injected engine for a minute or so until the traffic light turns green, burns little fuel and may avoid early-starter motor failure, and the resultant repair cost and the risk of being stranded.
- 5. If you are replacing your present car, research could find the best fit in a more fuel-efficient car. Other things being equal, a smaller, lighter car gets better mpg (expect a 2500-pound car to get about twice the mpg of a 5000-pound car). Also, you may find a smaller car that unexpectedly fits your needs. For example, one small 2016 hatchback (per www.cars.com) has a maximum cargo volume more than twice that of a popular direct competitor and larger than that of the latter's next bigger brother, and has an EPA passenger volume bigger than either, and (per www.fuelly.com) has real-world mpg (averaged over multiple owners) better than either.

KALAMAZOO DEACONS CONFERENCE

The Kalamazoo Deacons Conference is a local organization that works each day to make Kalamazoo a better place to live. KDC recognizes the physical and spiritual needs of the poor in our community and attends to these needs by sharing the love and hope of Jesus Christ.

While other organizations in Kalamazoo meet the physical needs of the poor and the homeless, such as shelter, food and clothing, KDC strives to fill the gap for the underserved and working poor of our community. The Kalamazoo Deacons Conference views these challenges and opportunities through the lens of the love, power, and grace that we receive through the Holy Spirit for their work.

KDC begins the day with an open invitation to spend time in the Scriptures and in prayer with the staff and those of the community who come to the building for support. Assistance is given to those in need through the DRS (Direct Response Servants) who take the time to listen and address the physical and spiritual needs of the individual and families that come to KDC. Physical needs that are met include transportation (tokens), I.D. and birth certificates, clothing, food, personal hygiene items, household goods, furniture, and appliances. Building relationship and treating each guest with dignity is also a priority. Prayer is offered for those who request it, along with the use of a prayer room when needed or desired. Devotional material is always available.

KDC assistance doesn't end there. Their desire to help men and women grow and develop initiated the S.T.E.P program, which offers certified training and certificates for both custodial training and retail sales. The implementation of more of these employment and development programs is in the future plans of KDC.

Walid is a regular political blogger for *The Detroit News*, and has been interviewed and quoted in approximately 100 media outlets, including *New York Times*, *Wall Street Journal*, CNN, Al-Jazeera, and National Public Radio. He served in the U.S. Navy, earning two achievement awards. He received awards of recognition from the city councils of Detroit and Hamtramck, as well as from a number of varied religious and community organizations.

Convened in January, 2003, the **Kalamazoo Interfaith Coalition for Peace and Justice (KICPJ)** welcomes people from all faith and spiritual traditions who wish to engage in local, national, and international issues involving peace and justice. The first Peace Service sponsored by the Kalamazoo Interfaith Coalition for Peace and Justice, was held in March, 2003 at Stetson Chapel, Kalamazoo College, to protest the imminent war with Afghanistan. In addition to the annual peace services, KICPJ holds an annual forum each fall to discuss various social concerns related to peace and justice.

March is Organ Donation Awareness Month!!

Sign Up to Be a Donor: Don't Rule Yourself Out

All people regardless of age should consider themselves potential organ and tissue donors. There are few absolute exclusions (such as HIV infection, active cancer, systemic infection) and no strict upper or lower age limits. Potential donors will be evaluated for suitability when the occasion arises.

Too Old?

No one is too old or too young. Both newborns and senior citizens have been organ donors. The condition of your organs is more important than age. Someone 35 years old with a history of alcohol abuse may have a liver that is in worse condition than someone 60 years old who has never consumed alcohol. Doctors will examine your organs and determine whether they are suitable for donation if the situation arises. If you are under 18, you may need the permission of a parent or guardian to donate.

Medical Condition?

You may still be able to donate your organs. Doctors will evaluate the condition of your organs when the time arises. The transplant team's decision will be based on a combination of factors, such as your specific illness and your physical condition, to determine which organs/tissues can be donated. Organ donation is a simple way that each of us can make a difference in someone else's life.
