A Minute in Ministry

On a recent steamy afternoon, there was a gathering in Bronson Park that included lots of Presbyterians from FPC, Pine Island, and Westminster churches. Wearing orange shirts, hats, buttons, and flowers, people of all stripes, from babies to octogenarians, gathered to call for sane gun policies and practices. Beyond the crowd itself, I was shocked when City Councilman, Don Cooney, told the crowd that since 9/11, 74 people had been killed by terrorists, while 150,000 Americans had been gunned down by one another! I was deeply moved by the message emblazoned on the orange t-shirt of the father of the young girl still recovering from the shooting in April. It said, "Love is stronger than fear. Love is stronger than death."

As I write, Kalamazoo is reeling, following the deaths of five bicyclists killed by a motorist, and news is breaking of the worst mass shooting in American history, in Orlando. By the time you read this, more information will have become clear, and the reach of this most recent carnage will have begun to sink in. In anticipation of my retirement and taking my leave of you all on August 14, I had planned to offer some reflections on the life of this congregation. Now I see a necessary relationship between these terrible events in our public life and our life as a Christian community.

Worship is the central act of the church. In worship, we remember the goodness of God and experience and receive new life out of death; we're reminded that we are neither our own nor alone; that love is stronger than fear and love is stronger than death. I give thanks for our worship together, and for all the gifted people who play a part in it: custodians and readers, children, musicians, elders and deacons, greeters and ushers, bread makers, communion preparers, pastors, and most centrally, worshipers. Without worship, we're nice people in a service club. Worship keeps God central.

Vital churches give to the world what we have received and treasure. Our lives say what we really love. Who we are, and how we live, speak far more loudly to the world than anything we say. Out of love for God, we strive to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God. I give thanks for the work we do together: refurbishing houses, packaging or sharing food, tutoring kids, tending gardens, and caring for the earth. I give thanks for all who live their faith every day in classrooms, board rooms, offices and galleries, community kitchens, at bedsides, in traffic, and around kitchen tables. My heart sings when Reading Aloud folks look out for one another, when a child prays for her friend, when I see a quiet conversation between friends, or a new deacon, who travels for work, arranges Sunday rides from halfway across the world. I give thanks for countless acts of kindness and courage no one ever sees.

Vital churches stand somewhere. It's never easy and we won't be 100% consistent. Even churches that look homogeneous have diverse views within them. Still, we can and must hammer out a place to stand, because where we stand witnesses to the world. If we eschew violence, there are implications for war, physical and sexual abuse, guns, and poverty. If all are equal in Christ, what about the distribution of goods, racism, toxic dumps, the well-being of children and the elderly, and again, war? If we value mercy and hospitality, how might we respond to refugees and immigration, medical care, and homelessness? I give thanks for the courageous places FPC has stood, the places that will yet be claimed, and the grace in it all.

To be sure, we will sometimes miss the mark in our worship, ministries, and witness. Fear of being wrong is no reason not to try. Love is stronger than fear. Love is stronger than death.

SESSION MEETING HIGHLIGHTS May 2016

The following motions were made and adopted:

- to approve \$1,500 from the Ford-Neff Fund for Tillers International programs.

JAZZ VESPERS—July 29

The Worship and Music Committee is excited to offer a special opportunity for worship on Friday evening, July 29. The Reverend Bill Carter and the Presbybop Quartet will be here to lead us in a Jazz Vespers Service. The Reverend Carter is the pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Clarks Summit (PA) and a well-known musician and worship leader. His Presbybop Quartet has eight recordings and is nationally acclaimed for its music and liturgical leadership. We hope you will invite your friends and neighbors to join us for this very special worship experience.

GIVE-A-BELL PROGRAM BEGINS JULY 3

Something new is being added to our outstanding music program: Handbells and Choirchimes! Malmark Handbells and Choirchimes are crafted in Pennsylvania and have a lifetime guarantee. They are a gift that lasts for generations to come! We will have a three-octave set (37 bells) of both bells and chimes. Anyone can learn to play the bells, and the chimes are especially suitable for children to play.

There are several ways by which you may wish to participate in the "Give-a-Bell" Program. Single bell sponsorship ranges from \$316 to \$517, depending on the size of the bell. The sponsorship cost of each bell includes a portion of the cost of cases, tables, music binders, shipping, and other equipment needed for the program.

You may choose to give a bell individually, or several members or families may give a bell together. The handle of each bell will provide a place for permanent inscription in honor or in memory of a loved one. You may also choose to contribute to the purchase of Choirchimes in any amount. Choirchimes cannot be engraved, but a permanent acknowledgement of donors will be placed in the cases.

Beginning July 3, there will be a table in the Gathering Place each Sunday where you can ring a bell and make your gift.

We are excited about all the possibilities this program brings to our church, and we expect to have our bells and chimes ready to play this fall. If you are interested in ringing bells, please speak to our Music Director, Cindy Hunter.

ENDOWMENT

"Above all, maintain constant love for one another, for love covers a multitude of sins. Be hospitable to one another without complaining. Like good stewards of God's manifold grace, put your gifts at the service of one another, each in the measure he has received."

1 Peter 4:8-10.

The purpose of the Endowment Committee is to manage and review the investments of the Endowment Fund, encourage contributions, and recommend to Session annual distributions from the fund. Quarterly reports from the Portfolio Manager are provided to the committee and are personally presented in January and July. Investment selections are in keeping with the philosophy and spiritual values of the FPC Congregation, with a focus on social responsibility and environmental consciousness.

Session currently administers the Endowment Fund, which includes—

- The **General Endowment Fund**, a permanent fund to support the general operating budget of the church.
- Designated Endowed Funds, contributions made by members or friends for a special program, project or need of the church that holds special meaning for them. A new Designated Fund can be established with a gift of \$50,000 or more, and with approval of Session.

Special gifts contributed during one's lifetime that go beyond an annual pledge are supplemental opportunities for stewardship. These gifts may commemorate a memorial, birthday, anniversary, or baptism. Special gifts through a will or estate plan may have the potential for additional growth. We encourage consultation with a professional financial advisor before making a special gift.

STEWARDSHIP

As mentioned in the June issue of the *Presbyter*, the largest portion of the <u>local</u> Outreach Budget goes to Ministry with Community. As a Sanctuary in the City, FPC supports this mission in many ways: by serving dinner on the first Sunday of each month, bagging groceries at Loaves & Fishes, donating hotel-size toiletries, as well as granting requests for financial assistance through the Deacons. We are excited that their new building will be opening in mid-July to enrich the needs of its members.

The largest portion of the global Outreach Budget goes to the Presbytery of Lake Michigan. Those monies are used for supporting our partners in Nicaragua, Peacemaking, Camp Greenwood for our youth, Campus Ministry, church growth, and Presbyterian Pilgrimage, to name a few.

As we contemplate the upcoming stewardship season, we remember that stewardship is not God taking something from us; it is his way of bestowing his richest gifts upon his people, as described by Randy Alcorn in his book, *The Treasure Principle: Discovering the Secret of Joyful Giving.*


SUMMER CHOIR

Summer Choir rehearses Sunday mornings at 9:30 in the Choir Room (Lower Level), and sings at the 10:30 worship service.



Nanami was unable to attend our graduation Sunday because of the "sleeping in boxes" event. She was a foreign exchange student with us all year and was absolutely a wonderful addition to our youth group. Here is her message:

"I come from a Buddhist family like most Japanese families, but I'm not really religious, and I was never really interested, so I came here with almost zero knowledge of Christianity. Everything I experienced related to church was completely new for me.

I had a lot of tough things and difficulties this year, and there were times at first when I got lost in my own troubles and stress, that I couldn't think about anyone else but myself. But through my time here, I found out that if you think really hard, you'll know what you need to do, just like God's talking to you, and there are people who always love and support you and people who are less fortunate than you are. There's a lot of things that I learned from coming to this church, but there's definitely way more things I don't know, and even out of things I learned, there's a lot of things I don't understand at all or don't really agree with. However, I will always remember to 'love God, and love others' and to show that with my attitude, because it's one of my big foundings this year.

After I go back, I'll finish my two more years of high school. I'm thankful that I was able to come to this church and meet all of you, and I hope that the Peace of Christ will always be with you."

The son of a father who helped liberate a concentration camp, Stuart Deming has had a particular interest in war crimes throughout his career. He has also had first-hand experience. Stuart will discuss his work on war crimes in Ethiopia, and his work in conjunction with the American Bar Association with the War Crimes Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia. He will focus on the realities of bringing justice to those responsible for war crimes, and the current trend toward reliance on "truth commissions" in transitional societies.

August 7 - Linda Mah

Linda Mah has had a long career as a journalist with the *Kalamazoo Gazette*. Over the years, she has reported on numerous topics involving courts, education, and health. Linda has also written a column. Her endearing personality came through in her sharing of family anecdotes and her reviews of local restaurants. Linda is currently employed as a communications specialist with the Kalamazoo Public Schools.

August 14 - Dr. Mark Loehrke

Mark Loehrke is a physician at Western Michigan University School of Medicine. He serves as the Chair of the Medicine Department and Program Director of the Internal Medicine Residency Program there. For more than 28 years he has been involved in patient care and teaching medical students and internal medicine residents. "He reads about one book a year, and *When Breath Becomes Air* was it for this past year. So you know this book must be pretty special! " - Mark Loehrke

August 21 - Garrett Boersma

Garrett is a retired Special Education teacher, administrator, and college instructor. He will be reading parts of Frank Backman's best-selling book, *A Man Called Ove: A Novel*. MONTHLY WEDNESDAY NIGHT MEN'S GROUP


July 13 and August 10 (Wednesdays), 5:30 p.m.
