A Minute in Ministry

I am excited to share more good news about progress with our visioning process and related work, beginning immediately!

At the August meeting of Session, the Vision Team presented priorities for our congregation to pursue in the next few years. Elders shared extended discussion at that meeting, and gathered again two weeks later for another special meeting focused on that report. With sincere gratitude for efforts of the Vision Team and with hopeful expectation for the good work we can all begin together. Session approved the Priorities for our congregation at its meeting on September 28. Two documents are available at the church entrances: 1) an extensive summary of data gathered during the visioning process; and 2) the revised and reapproved Vision and Mission statements of our congregation, along with details about six priority areas for 2017 – 2020. As noted before, these priorities are not intended to be a comprehensive list of all the ministry and mission we share. They respond particularly to concerns and opportunities which arose during the visioning process, as ways to further strengthen our life and witness. There will ever remain very good and important work that continues among many other committees and groups in our congregation! All of our efforts ultimately relate and support one another. All are needed as parts of the Body of Christ. All are entwined through the service of Christ's love, nurturing abundant life for the glory of God!

While all of our work connects directly and complements indirectly in wider perspective, we always need people to catalyze particular efforts. We have identified lead committees for each priority area. And some individuals who served on the Vision Team have volunteered to continue engaging efforts in their chosen areas of interest. I hope you will learn more about the priorities we envisioned, and find a way to get involved!

Building on the foundational work of the visioning process, we are already moving toward seeking a new Associate Pastor. Throughout the search process ahead. we want to ensure fairness and transparency, consistency with our priorities, and efficiency, without undue delays. As I write, the Personnel Committee is finalizing the responsibilities and expectations of the position to consider at our October Session meeting. A liaison member of the Presbytery Committee on Ministry will also attend that meeting to begin to coordinate action "decently and in order." Next steps include: requesting permission to form an Associate Pastor Nominating Committee (APNC); election of APNC members by the congregation; completion of forms and documentation related to the search; then moving into interviewing. I am hopeful that we can have the APNC formed and working by the holidays. with active consideration of candidates beginning early in the New Year.

Finally, through this interim period and beyond, we continue to be blessed with the work of our Parish Associates. You will find again in this issue an outline of areas in which each plans to serve. Please, contact them if you have any personal concerns or questions related to committees they support!

SESSION MEETING HIGHLIGHTS OCTOBER, 2016

The following motions were made and adopted:

- to approve use of the Basil Leong Memorial for an interpretive plaque for the sculpture on the front of the church.
- to allow the Finance Committee
 to conduct an annual <u>review</u> for
 2017 in lieu of an <u>audit</u>. And the
 Finance Committee recommends
 that a review, rather than an audit,
 be completed on an annual basis,
 beginning 2017 for 2018.
- to approve the Request for Financial Appeals, received from the Communications Committee, to sell T-shirts for the church, in order to finance the purchase of more T-shirts.
- to approve \$2,000 from the Ford-Neff Fund for Eve's Angels Shelter for victims of human trafficking.
- to approve the Proposed Vision for First Presbyterian Church and the Proposed Priorities from the Strategic Visioning Committee, as amended.

In the last *Presbyter*, Larry Farris offered a clever joke to describe the work of the parish associates. I'm afraid I'm far less creative, but I can say with confidence that all four of us parish associates are enjoying the opportunity to be part of the life of our congregation in new ways during this time of transition following our dear Mary's retirement! Although our roles and tasks differ, each of us is focused on supporting and resourcing folks with our particular interests and gifts. For my part, visiting people in homes, hospitals, and elsewhere, as well as working with Deacons, is a tender reminder that our lives can be richly lived and deeply blessed when we are part of a community of faith. My favorite poet, Wendell Berry, suggests that we often forget that "we belong to one another", with sometimes disastrous consequences. I am encouraged and inspired by the many ways I see FPC living out examples of what it means to truly belong to one another. Please know that four parish associates are here to support and celebrate the life of our congregation as we journey together!

Below is a brief outline of ways we can expect each individual to serve.

<u>Larry Boutelle</u> will serve as staff resource for Hospitality Committee and Stewardship Committee, lead adult education opportunities, offer some pastoral care, and share in worship leadership.

<u>Liz Hakken-Candido</u> will offer emergency pastoral care, lead adult education opportunities, and share in worship leadership.

<u>Larry Farris</u> will serve as staff resource for Health Ministry Committee and Green Ps Committee, lead adult education opportunities, offer some pastoral care, and share in worship leadership.

<u>Kathleen Robertson King</u> will serve as staff resource for Deacons, providing some expanded pastoral care, lead adult education opportunities, and share in worship leadership.

Unfortunately, I was not able to dodge that bullet. So here I am, conveying a message on behalf of the Stewardship Committee.

In my short time on the Committee, I have come to learn three basic things:

- 1. First, only one person on the committee, the chair, and only two staff members, know the particulars of anyone's pledge. So if we are pressing you to send in your pledge for the coming year, please understand that we will not know the particulars of those pledges.
- 2. Secondly, the committee needs your help. We need more members, particularly female members, and we need and welcome your thoughts and suggestions as to how we can be more effective. We recognize that this is a terribly sensitive issue for all of us. So tap one of us on the shoulder, send us an email, or give us a call. We will welcome your input.
- 3. Lastly, and maybe most importantly, I have come to appreciate that as a church we have been actually operating at a deficit in recent years. What we take in is much less than what we actually spend. It is only because of the income from our endowments that the gap is being filled.

The bottom line is that we all need to step up. So please keep this in mind as you complete your pledge card for the coming year. And again, let us know how to do a better job of carrying out this delicate task.



CHILDREN'S ADVENT WREATHS

The Children of First Presbyterian Church will be making their Advent wreaths during Church School on Sunday, November 27, the first week of Advent.

The Advent wreath is a Christian tradition that symbolizes the passage of the four weeks of Advent in the liturgical calendar of the Western church. It is a horizontal evergreen wreath with four candles and often, a fifth, white candle in the center. Beginning the First Sunday of Advent, the lighting of a candle can be accompanied by a Bible reading, devotional time, and prayers. An additional candle is lighted during each subsequent week until, by the last Sunday before Christmas, all four candles are lit. Many Advent wreaths include a fifth, Christ candle, which is lighted on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. The custom is observed both in family settings and at public church services.

In some churches, the candles represent hope, peace, love, and joy. Often the third candle, representing love, is a different color than the other three, representing the importance of love as the greatest of all the qualities that abide eternally.


Thursday Morning Women's Bible Study

DCLC (Downtown Community Literacy Center)

Hello, everyone!!! It is so good to have a chance to report on what your DCLC – Downtown Community Literacy Center is doing. We are one of fourteen Community Literacy Centers in the Kalamazoo Area. Our own DCLC (Downtown Community Literacy Center) opened April 30, 2014. The Kalamazoo Literacy Council has grown from 49 tutors serving 55 students in 2010 to 222 tutors serving 533 students in 2016.

At DCLC we offer tutoring in reading, writing, and computer skills. At this writing, we have 7 students. Two of these students are taking not just one, but two classes. We have a total of 8 active tutors. Two of these tutors are from outside our church family. We have one assessor on site; however, other assessors use our site, also.

In 2016 we have two students who went from Laubach 1 to Laubach 2 and one who progressed from Laubach 2 to Laubach 4. One of our students worked very hard to pass his driver's license test and completed that just this last month. We have had 82 students enter our doors since our opening in 2014. They came for Assessments, Reading, Writing and/or Computer instruction.

If you get a chance, please thank these dedicated DCLC Active Tutors: Lester Coleman, Tom Forsch, Sue Johnson, Nancy Maleitzke, Donna Schonveld, and Mary Smyser. Pat Stromsta has just recently stepped out of tutoring, as she is needed in other areas. The two tutors from outside our church are Marian Burkey and Sue Thayer.

The Kalamazoo Literacy Council, as well as our DCLC, is always in need of additional tutors. You may be interested in volunteer work such as English as a Second Language (ESL) instruction, which is a primary need for refugees, and at this time, there are actually 311 more potential students than teachers in the Kalamazoo area. You may become an advocate for literacy.

GHANA REPORT

Our congregation was very fortunate to have the Rev. Joshua Heikkila. PC(USA) West Africa Liaison, as a visitor on Sunday, September 18. Besides providing a brief overview of Presbyterian outreach to Ghana and W. Africa during the morning worship service, he met with interested folks from our congregation following the worship service and, later in the day, he met with others from Presbytery for conversation at an evening meal. Our outreach to Ghana has been immensely assisted by his presence in Ghana. The Outreach Committee annually includes funds to support Josh's ministry in Ghana.

John Petro and Raymond Wicks from our congregation represented our congregation and our Presbytery at the 15th Annual Ghana Mission Network meeting in September. Highlights of the 15th GMN meeting included conversations on leadership training, women's issues, outreach projects, financial concerns, visas, and also the topics of immigrant Ghanaian congregations and fellowships in America. One very interesting suggestion was that American congregations and their Ghanaian partners should consider establishing their own "green" congregational goals for carbon offset, thus stimulating each other to reduce carbon emissions.

OUTREACH SPOTLIGHT

Kalamazoo Drop-In Care Center

In partnership with our current Outreach support of the Kalamazoo Drop-In Child Care Center (KDCCC), our congregation will collect donations from the KDCCC wish list of items they consume every week at the center.

The Kalamazoo Drop-In Child Care Center provides free shortterm child care for low-income families with children from six weeks through five years of age. This Center provides a warm, safe, and supportive environment for children and their parents.

During 2015, KDCCC cared for 212 children from 153 families. Thank you for your continued support of this much-needed service in our community!

Partners in Housing Transition

Partners in Housing Transition is a semi-independent project of St. Luke's Episcopal Church. They partner with ten social service agencies in Kalamazoo to help formerly homeless families attain self-sufficiency by providing them with furniture and household furnishings. Last year, they provided furniture and basic essentials for over 100 families with 265 children.

They are looking for housekeeping items such as: dressers, beds, sofas and love seats, living room chairs, end tables, lamps, vacuum cleaners, place settings, blankets and linens, cooking pots, frying pans, small appliances, kitchen utensils, and cleaning supplies.
