A Minute in Ministry

So we've come to another New Year. However intentional we are (or not!) with resolutions, we sense the transition marked on a calendar and felt in our lives. We review the past months and experiences we've shared, for better or for worse. We look forward to anticipated joys and unexpected challenges that are sure to arise. And through it all, we long to live with meaning and purpose and peace.

As we mark the New Year in our congregational life, there are transitions continuing in our ministry and in the society around us. In this *Presbyter*, you will find an update from Ginny Dell on progress with our Associate Pastor search process. We are excited to be moving forward efficiently (thanks in part to all the good work done previously through the visioning process) and with great hopes for possibilities in this position, as we live into our priorities. See Ginny's article for more detail. And Liz Hakken Candido, one of our Parish Associates, offers reflection on the church in society from the perspective of her work among the Kalamazoo College community. I encourage you to note her important insights.

We will also mark our transition in leadership positions with the ordination and installation of deacons and elders on Sunday, January 15. It is always a time of inspiring worship which makes me profoundly grateful to be Presbyterian, as we recognize, affirm, and nurture our shared gifts for ministry in God's grace. In the many ways we seek to follow Jesus Christ, it is really a call to living faith that all of us share. As you consider responsibilities in your personal lives and your connection with our congregation, I wonder how you might nurture meaningful rhythms and routines?

Last year, I began service among the wider Presbyterian Church (USA) as a faculty member for CREDO. CREDO literally means "I believe" or "I give my heart to ..." Clergy who are actively serving in our denomination are invited to spend a CREDO week of reflection on all facets of a healthy life and ministry – spiritual health, mental health, physical health, financial health, vocational leadership, etc. I serve as spiritual faculty. Among many things I love about CREDO is the encouragement to formulate a personal "rule of life". It's sort of like New Year's Resolutions on steroids! These aren't legalistic rules for judgment, but more like guidelines, patterns, rhythms, and routines we identify to help nurture a vibrant life with God and service to others.

CREDO has been such a good experience, I wonder if there are ways we can use that kind of inspiration in our congregation. In truth, the simple fact is that we all have such rhythms and routines which we've formed, for better and for worse. The question really is how intentional we are about them. Christians in all ages have tried to be intentional in different ways, with varying practices and emphases. I seek to follow a rule of the lona Community, with which I am associated. And I've modified their rule a bit to suit my personality and situation. In coming weeks of worship we will tell again the stories of the first disciples following Jesus. In that spirit, on Sundays January 29–February 19, I plan to offer reflection on some rhythms or priorities that I find important and helpful. Maybe they could catalyze reflection and practical inspiration for you, as well. And as ever, if you wish to speak further about any of these matters, please simply contact me!

ASSOCIATE PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Greetings, friends,

At a recent Special Meeting of the Congregation, an APNC (Associate Pastor Nominating Committee) was formed and recently commissioned for the sole purpose of bringing to the congregation nominees for our next Associate Pastor.

The following members have been nominated to serve on this Special Committee of the Session: Chris Bol, Mason Coleman (Treasurer), Ginny Dell (Moderator), Jay Heckler, Craig Kortlandt (Recording Secretary), Brenda Noel, Kelsey Oliver, Sally Pitt-VanBuren (Vice-Moderator) and Pamela Zandt (Corresponding Secretary). The Session has approved \$10,000 in the 2017 Church Budget to complete the interviewing and moving expenses for this process.

The Session approved the Ministry Information Form (MIF) at the December meeting and moved the MIF to the Presbytery of Lake Michigan for review and approval. The Committee on Ministry (COM) approved the MIF on December 20. The MIF is now in the process of being entered into the PCUSA Leadership Connection Website to seek possible matches. These matches will be forwarded to the APNC as they are received. The APNC will also be posting the MIF in other ways to seek as many candidates for evaluation as possible.

The APNC will resume its weekly meetings on January 9th until the work is finished. The goal is to have the field of candidates narrowed by early spring with the hope of hiring our new Associate Pastor soon thereafter.

The APNC would very much appreciate your prayers as we begin this most important journey of living out our faith together in this time and place.

A WORD FROM THE PARISH ASSOCIATES

(from the Reverend Liz Candido, Parish Associate)

I'm often asked why more young adults don't attend church. The answer, as you can imagine, is complicated and not easily answered in one paragraph. Still, one significant reason is that religious affiliation among millennials is historic. They know they are Christian because their grandparents are Christian or because they were baptized but not because of their own experiences in religious communities.

These young people have also received strong messages about Christianity as a limit to their personal autonomy. Christianity, in their minds, limits their freedom of personal expression and supports moral teachings that they are unwilling to affirm; namely, Christianity is understood to be anti-LGBTQ, anti-science and anti-religious diversity.

One challenge our church, and every church, faces moving forward is thinking about how we communicate about who we are and why we are who we are today. So often, church is talked about as a stalwart against the modern world—the place that holds onto family values as the world changes, etc. Much of my work as a College Chaplain is spent trying to help students think about the modern world as a place to meet Christ. Faith is, I believe, not an invitation to resist the modern world, but a way of living fully and freely in that world.

First Presbyterian Church is uniquely situated to speak to these concerns. We are a sanctuary <u>in</u> the city, not <u>from</u> the city. My hope and prayer is that every person who walks through the doors of our church is challenged to meet Christ in the very real and complex city of Kalamazoo.



Below is a brief outline of ways we can expect each of the Parish Associate to serve.

<u>Larry Boutelle</u> will serve as staff resource for Hospitality Committee and Stewardship Committee, lead adult education opportunities, offer some pastoral care, and share in worship leadership.

<u>Liz Hakken-Candido</u> will offer emergency pastoral care, lead adult education opportunities, and share in worship leadership.

<u>Larry Farris</u> will serve as staff resource for Health Ministry Committee and Green P's Committee, lead adult education opportunities, offer some pastoral care, and share in worship leadership.

<u>Kathleen Robertson King</u> will serve as staff resource for Deacons, providing some expanded pastoral care, lead adult education opportunities, and share in worship leadership.


CLASS PRESENTED BY SETH WEELDREYER

"Harry Potter and C. S. Lewis Teach Us What Love Is"

Joanne Rowling's Harry Potter novels have been widely embraced because of their wisdom and insight on many topics—the right use of one's gifts, navigating adolescence, the importance of imagination, the power of friendship, the nature of evil, and what love is. Join Parish Associate Larry Farris to explore the last of these on Sunday, January 15, following Worship. Using another fine English author's book, *The Four Loves*, by C. S. Lewis, we will explore how Harry comes to understand the power of love as contrasted with Voldemort's love of power. Familiarity with the Harry Potter novels will be helpful, and those attending will also be helped by reading or listening to Rowling's commencement address at Harvard University some years ago (available in book form as *Very Good Lives* or at harvardmagazine.com/2008/06/the-fringe-benefits-failure-the-importance-imagination.)

Study of Pope Francis' Encyclical on Climate Change
"Laudato Si' – On Care for Our Common Home"

Pope Francis' short book on climate change is a beautifully written document which speaks to this issue from the perspective of the Christian faith and links it to other crucial Christian concerns such as poverty. Parish Associate Larry Farris will lead a discussion of 'Laudato Si' – which means "Praise Be unto You" - over three Sundays, February 12, 19 and 26, following worship. WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY

Wednesday Women's Bible Study Class

Wednesday Evening Bible Study meets the first Wednesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in Room 300. We read and discuss Thomas Merton's *Bridges to Contemplative Living, Book 1: Entering the School of your Experience*. Members and guests are welcome.

Thursday Women's Bible Study

We will begin our study of Paul's letters on January 12 with 1 Thessalonians. Known as Saul prior to his ministry, Paul was born of Hebrew parents about A.D. 5, or a few years earlier, in Tarsus, a city of Cilicia. He later became a Roman citizen and also became fluent in speaking and writing in the Greek language. He was brought up in boyhood in Jerusalem, where he was taught by Gamaliel. Before he became a Christian missionary, he was a Pharisee. His trade was tent-making.

After his miraculous conversion in A.D. 37, he participated in missionary expeditions. On the first journey (A.D. 45-47), Barnabas was his partner. On the second journey (A.D. 50-54), Silas (or Silvanus) travelled with him. For part of the third journey (A.D. 50-54), Luke was his partner. Paul was imprisoned in Jerusalem in A.D. 58, in Cæsarea from A.D. 58-60, and in Rome from A.D. 61-63 and from A.D. 65-67.

Although many letters in the New Testament are claimed to have been written by Paul, most scholars who have studied them have reached the conclusion that only seven of the letters were actually written by Paul when he lived in the early First Century, around 20 to 30 years after the death of Jesus. The late Marcus Borg urged us to read the New Testament in the order in which the books were actually written rather than the order in which they appear in modern Bibles. We should start with the letters of Paul because they are our earliest texts from the Christ movement.

The seven authentic or "undisputed" letters of Paul, in roughly chronological order, are as follows:

- 1 Thessalonians
- Galatians
- 1 Corinthians
- 2 Corinthians
- Philemon
- Philippians
- Romans

We meet at 9:30 for coffee, and our discussion begins at 9:45. New members are always welcome, and nursery is provided in Room 306.



KALAMAZOO DEACONS CONFERENCE

Kalamazoo Deacons Conference (KDC) is a local organization that works each day to make Kalamazoo a better place to live. KDC recognizes the physical and spiritual needs of the poor in our community and attends to these needs by sharing the love and hope of Jesus Christ.

While other organizations in Kalamazoo meet the physical needs of the poor and the homeless, such as shelter, food, and clothing, KDC strives to fill the gap for the underserved and working poor of our community. The Kalamazoo Deacons Conference views these challenges and opportunities for their work through the lens of the love, power, and grace that we receive through the Holy Spirit.

KDC begins the day with an open invitation to spend time with the Scriptures and in prayer with the staff and those of the community who come to the building for support. Assistance is given to those in need through the DRS (Direct Response Servants) who take the time to listen and address the physical and spiritual needs of the individuals and families that come to KDC. Physical needs that are met include transportation (tokens), I.D. and birth certificates, clothing, food, personal hygiene items, household goods, furniture, and appliances. Building relationship and treating each guest with dignity is also a priority. Prayer is offered to those who request it, along with the use of a prayer room when needed or desired Devotional material is always available.

KDC assistance doesn't end there. Their desire to help men and women grow and develop initiated the S.T.E.P program, which offers certified training and certificates for both custodial training and retail sales. The implementation of more of these employment and development programs is in the future plans of KDC.

EDISON SCHOOL OUTREACH PROJECT

Tracy Zarei has wanted to teach children ever since she was in the second grade. She knew she would have to go to college to become a teacher.

"She was a straight-A student," says her mother, Sheri, who was working double shifts in a nursing home to pay rent on their mobile home. ...

Then one day Tracy's world shifted... it was a positive pregnancy test. Tracy was a junior in high school. For many teenage mothers, this is when school ends and hardship begins. By age 22, only half of all single mothers in the United States receive a high school diploma, compared with 90 percent of their peers.

With her mother's help, Tracy went back for her senior year. Money would be tight, but perhaps she could enroll in community college, work her way toward a teaching certificate – and defy the stereotyped limitations of being a teen parent. "I couldn't just be another statistic," she says.

Enter the **Kalamazoo Promise.** A group of anonymous donors had agreed to pay for up to four years of college tuition for most students in the district who graduated that year — and for all future classes. The idea, says Ms. Janice Brown, a trustee of the scholarship, is to change the lives of young people first and the community second. "It's a transformative movement," she says.

It took Tracy six years to earn a bachelor's degree. The Promise covered 75 percent of her tuition, since she had attended a charter school for middle school (the program doesn't underwrite charter school students). So she worked part-time as a waitress, trying to juggle classes and child care, falling behind at times, going into debt.

Tracy graduated from Western in 2012—something she is certain she would never have been able to do without the Promise. "There would've been a point where I couldn't continue," she says. The fall after she graduated, Tracy got a call from **Edison Environmental Science Academy**. Today, the sign on the door to her classroom at **Edison**, which educates some of the poorest kids in town, reads: "Ms. Zarei's Super Heroes." ... "I can relate to a lot of families at our school," she says. "It's high poverty. They have their struggles, and I've been through all that."
