# A MINUTE IN MINISTRY

Thanksgiving is in the air! Wait. What? Most of us will receive this *Presbyter* before Hallowe'en costumes and decorations are put away and the spooky fun is done. And then commercial marketing will move right on to Christmas. Not much money to be made from Thanksgiving, I guess. Still, I've always loved the holiday at least as much as any other. And over the years in ministry, I've come to appreciate the spirit and practice of giving thanks at the core of faith. I get why St. Paul expresses it so often in his letters to early followers of Jesus.

Like Paul, I cherish the fact that everything we do as a congregation begins with good people like you. Our witness to God's love in our world arises from our vision, our passion, our contributions of time, money, ability. Should I name examples? I could go on forever and leave someone out. As I've said before, gratitude is the beginning of faithfulness. Gratitude moves us to give in responses and invite others to share the effort. Out of gratitude, life grows even more. In St. Paul's letters, he always moves from expressing gratitude to calling for further, renewed faithfulness.

Let's be real, friends. Many of us, from varying perspectives and experiences, have felt it's been a bit of a rough time in life recently—culturally and personally. There's a place for lamentation—for expressing disappointment and processing anxiety. But if that's where we get stuck, then we're in the tomb.

And we are resurrection people. We trust God's power to bring new life. We begin to receive it and make it real when we see what's good. We name, claim, proclaim that goodness. We feel inspired to share it with others. And Christ is revealed in our loving witness.

There are many ways we can and should live that faith in our ordinary, everyday lives beyond church. And inasmuch as we feel gratitude for life together in our congregation, I urge you to express it through your support and commitment. It's not spooky, but I hope there's some fun in it. It's not for commercial success. There's no great secret to vital ministry in churches. People get involved. And people tell others about what's happening, to invite them to connect in some way. Yes, thanksgiving is in the air! In this season and throughout the year, I pray we'll all catch the spirit and cherish the gift of our life together!

As Paul wrote to the Philippians: "I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ." (Philippians 1:3-6)

# CHILDREN'S ADVENT WREATH

Advent is a time of preparation for the birth of Christ. The word *advent* means "coming." During Advent, we celebrate the coming of Christ at Bethlehem, his coming into our hearts, and his Second Coming.

One of the most beloved traditions of the Advent Season at First Presbyterian Church is the children's assembling of a traditional Advent Wreath on the First Sunday of Advent (December 3rd). Advent wreaths are circular, representing God's infinite love, and are made of evergreen leaves. The wreath includes four candles— three purple and one pink.

Each candle on the Advent Wreath has a specific meaning:


• Candle 1 (purple) represents hope. It is often called the prophets' candle.

• Candle 2 (purple) represents peace. It is often called the angels' candle.

- Candle 3 (pink) represents joy.
- It is often called the shepherds' candle.
- Candle 4 (purple) represents love.
- It is often called the Bethlehem candle.

Many advent wreaths also include a Christ candle in the middle of the wreath.

Beginning with the first Sunday of Advent, the lighting of a candle can be accompanied by a Bible reading, devotional time, and prayers. An additional candle is lighted during each subsequent week. During the busy Advent Season, taking time to light our Advent candles allows us to remember that Jesus is the reason for the season.

The DCLC is open on Wednesdays from 4:30 - 6:30 p.m. and on Thursdays from 11:00 a.m. -1:00 p.m.





# PAINTING NORMA BERRY'S HOUSE: VINE ST PROJECT

The repainting of a house means so much more when it complements other nearby positive initiatives. And such was the case this year. Of course the painting thrilled owner Norma Berry, who had yearned for many years to give her house a proper paint job. But it also reinforced the many good things happening on nearby streets. Though somewhat lagging behind other areas, this northwest section of Vine is seeing a build-up of owner occupants and of housing investments more generally. The City of Kalamazoo has undertaken a series of street re-pavings, as well as a major park renovation. Residents have banded together to reclaim the Oak Street Garden and to install/maintain corner flower gardens all through the area. The neighborhood's resurgence, here as in other sections of Vine, is well underway.

With strong support from Seth and our Outreach Committee, FPC again took the leading position in this fall's project. Pulling together the paperwork and overseeing the effort with First Congregational Church and Trinity Lutheran, Sam Clark played an essential coordinating role. The availability of funding from all three churches enabled us to hire both skilled carpenters to replace rotten siding and a professional painter to scrape off the old paint, re-nail loose siding, and otherwise prepare the house for painting. As the long-time owner of an older house on Oak St., Norma herself purchased the paint, furnished at a considerable discount by Vine's Douglas and Sons store.

So it was that a largely FPC painting crew primed a large portion of the house on a blistering hot Saturday, September 23rd. Suzanne Rose skillfully managed the paint and brushes; with contributions from a host of food preparers, Laura Boersma coordinated refreshments and lunch; and with help from all to keep ladders standing straight and safe, we managed to keep ourselves safe. Associate Pastor Chrissy Westbury proved to be one of the most intrepid and enthusiastic painters.

Powered the following Saturday by a skilled and fast-moving crew from First Congregational Church, and complemented by another strong volunteer contribution from FPC, we largely finished applying a full two coats of paint. How we loved it when the last sections of ugly old siding were covered and when the "accent color" of dark blue was applied to the front and side gables. Our professional painter returned early the following week to finish up a few difficult areas. Active from the very beginning of the project, Dave and Sue Johnson also returned to help complete it. We have so much to be grateful for: the individual contributions of some 40-50 volunteers drawn from all three participating churches; the provision of funds, both from the three churches and from Norma herself; the Vine Neighborhood Association's management of funds; the planning and coordinating functions provided by Sam Clark and Garrett Boersma; and not least of all, the blessedly good weather enjoyed on both painting days. Norma was a generous and unfailingly cheerful participating owner.

Here are her own words of thanks:

"I am so grateful, not only because my house is now visually gorgeous, but also because I had this wonderful, uplifting experience of several dozen strangers coming together to do something just for me, just because they wanted to. I've shared my story with friends and family, and in my happiness, also with perfect strangers. Almost no one is aware of this kind of generosity. Thank you for your kindness."
