## MINUTE IN MINISTRY

I am not much of a sports person. What I know about sports I have learned as a way to connect with my sports-loving spouse and my athletic daughter. But once every couple of years, I become an avid sports fan. The Olympics have a way of drawing me in and making me pretend that I have some idea what I am talking about when it comes to athletics. During the Winter Olympics, I become obsessed with figure skating, I watch, enraptured, as each athlete takes the ice. I provide commentary to rival Johnny Weir and Tara Lipinski. "Look at that triple loop! Was that a quad? Did he make the last rotation?" As if I know anything about ice skating beyond just barely managing to stay on my feet.

What is it about the Olympics that draws in so many of us – even those of us who typically find sports...well...boring? For me, I think it is the beauty and wonder of seeing such a variety of people come together in the name of what unites them. From the pageantry of the opening ceremonies to the athletic events to the mountaintop moments on the podium, representatives of the world's nations come together to celebrate athleticism and healthy competition. Yes, there is patriotism. Yes, we cheer when Team USA does well. But it feels somehow different from the American exceptionalism rampant in our culture today. We want to watch athletes from all over the world do what they do best, and we recognize their skills and hard work even as we cheer for the home team.

Theologian Letty Russell once said, "God's intention is to create a world of riotous difference." I think the Olympics are an embodiment of that riotous difference. The athletes at the games come in every hue, speak many different languages, participate in different religions and different cultural norms, and they come together and live in the Olympic village in peace. It is, admittedly, a momentary reprieve. Many of these athletes will go back to nations where peace is hard to come by. Their neighbors in the Olympic village are their enemies at home. And yet, it is hard to believe that they can go away unchanged by this experience. South Korean and North Korean athletes who compete in these Games as a unified team will never again be able to separate the "idea" of their enemy on the other side of the border from the real, human teammate and friend they competed with on this worldwide stage.

During this Lenten season, we will be tackling together the works of German theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Bonhoeffer was primarily an academic theologian until the rise of fascism in Nazi Germany put him in a place where his faith could no longer be a matter of books, words, and individual thought. Faith, he realized leads to action. Some of those actions involved, as he put it, not just "bandaging the wounds of the victims under the wheel, but jamming the spoke in the wheel itself." Faith involves standing up against injustice. And faith involves recognizing that we are all in this thing together. Other people are not our enemies. Our enemies are injustice, poverty, racism, oppression, fascism.

We need to learn to recognize humanity in the faces of the people with whom we disagree. As Bonhoeffer said in his treatise on the Christian community: "I can no longer condemn or hate a brother for whom I pray, no matter how much trouble he causes me. His face, that hitherto may have been strange and intolerable to me, is transformed in intercession into the countenance of a brother for whom Christ died, the face of a forgiven sinner."

In this time of division and partisanship, let us all remember to pray for one another so that we may see that in spite of our differences, we are all one in Christ Jesus, and we all have a place at the table.

## WORSHIP DURING HOLY WEEK

## PALM SUNDAY—March 25

Our observance of Holy Week will begin with other churches at 10:00 a.m on Palm Sunday in Bronson Park with the "Blessing of the Palms". As Jesus paraded into Jerusalem amid the cultural and political powers of his day, so we will gather together with other churches to share the blessing of the palms, scripture reading, and a short litany for the day. Following this very brief time together, we will proceed into our respective sanctuaries for Worship. We will plan to begin the service in our Sanctuary around 10:10.

## MAUNDY THURSDAY—March 29

On Maundy Thursday, we remember Jesus' commandment to love, in the face of his impending arrest and crucifixion. Our worship, beginning at 7:00 p.m., will relate the narrative events of the first Maundy Thursday as told in the gospels of John and Mark, in a Tenebrae rhythm of scripture readings, interpretive reflection, hymns, and dimming lights. This service will include the Sacrament of Holy Communion, and for participation by our choir.

## **GOOD FRIDAY—March 30**

On Good Friday we will gather for Worship in a quiet, more contemplative mode, remembering the ancient story of Jesus' crucifixion. The service will begin at 7:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary.

## EASTER—APRIL 1

Our Holy Week Worship culminates with a celebration of the Resurrection of Christ during the regular service at 10:00 a.m. on Easter morning. Our Worship will include Holy Communion, special musical brass accompaniment, and, of course, the floral decoration of our Sanctuary as a beautiful expression of the life abundant we share in God's love. We are grateful to the Chancel Guild for their loving preparation of our Sanctuary.

## **BRINER LECTURER 2018**

At 3:00 p.m. on March 11, we welcome our Briner Lecturer, Al Staggs. His original play, "A View from the Underside: The Legacy of Dietrich Bonhoeffer", brings to life one of the great heroes of the twentieth century. The audience is brought into the prison cell where Bonhoeffer awaits execution, and listens as he struggles with evil, injustice, and God.



On Monday, March 12, Al will be lecturing on the theme of "Laughter for Life", relating how humor can contribute to a minister's service in areas of preaching, pastoral care, and adjusting to the pressures and demands of the pastorate. Join us Gathering Place at 9:00 am, before the lecture, for fellowship and coffee. Admission is free for both events.

## SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

- A motion to approve a financial appeal request from the Chancel Guild to sell Memorial Easter Lilies for the Sanctuary Easter decorations was adopted.
- A motion to approve the following from the Ford-Neff Endowment Fund: \$1000 towards the purchase of transportation for Josh Heikkila was made and adopted.
- A motion to approve an increase to the 2017 Worship and Music Budget for up to \$1,000 to Worship and Music to cover the purchase of a new computer for the sound system was adopted.
- A motion to approve the League of Women Voters providing voter information in the North and South Entrances was adopted.
- A motion to study the feasibility of converting the east transept into flexible seating was adopted.
- A motion to approve the 2018 First Presbyterian Church Budget of \$944,541 with the following provisos was adopted.
  - The Finance Committee will review and submit possible adjustments of the budget to session quarterly.
  - Each committee will monitor their expenses for possible cost savings to help ease the budget shortfall, and have their recommendations to the Finance Committee no later than the 1<sup>st</sup> Thursday of March, June and September.

## ENDOWMENT COMMITTEE NOTES

Your Endowment Fund had a good year in 2017. The fund gained 13.7% from income and capital gains. Distributions in support of the many ministries of our church totaled \$159,703. The Capital Improvement Fund provided \$53,789 for maintenance of our campus, and finished the year with a balance of \$160,555. The financial health of First Presbyterian Church depends on the financial support of all its members, and the Endowment Fund is the legacy of that support. Please consider your gift to the fund.

The Rickman House Bingo team of Bruce Birkel and Mike Boersma wishes to thank super-volunteers Pastor Chrissy Westbury, Larry Braak, and Marion Palmer, as well as all of the generous donors who responded to our request for prizes for the annual Christmas Bingo at Rickman House.

We had a good attendance and we served over half of the residents of Rickman House. We made sure that they received both essential goods, such as toilet paper, bus tokens, and laundry detergent, and also presents, such as warm socks and winter clothing. We also made sure that they had all the pizza that they wanted to eat.

Donated prizes benefited both Rickman House residents and their family members. Many Rickman House residents reported that they were using their prizes as gifts for family members.

Rickman House, can always use volunteers, it an assisted-living facility for adults with mental illness. There are currently 49 residents living there. Their ages range from the early 20's through the late 70's. Many residents have problems related to age, such as poor vision, bad hearing, or lack of mobility. We would be happy to have additional volunteers to assist these residents so that they can fully participate. Rickman House has been thoroughly remodeled and is completely modern and accessible.

The monthly Bingo night is a big event at Rickman House. The residents look forward to Bingo and plan their calendars accordingly. We have Bingo on the third Saturday of every month at 6:00 p.m.

## ALL-CHURCH READ DURING LENT —DIETRICH BONHOEFFER

As we journey through Lent, we will offer opportunities to reflect on the living faith of Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Bonhoeffer came of age in Germany between World Wars I and II. As Nazi decrees increased under Hitler, he spoke out in opposition. Though he could have escaped, Bonhoeffer chose to minister among the people of Germany.

During the war years, he led an illegal seminary to train pastors, and he operated as an Allied spy. Despite strong pacifist leanings, he helped coordinate an assassination attempt against Hitler. He was imprisoned and ultimately executed by direct order of Hitler just weeks before the war ended

We have compiled excerpts from Bonhoeffer's essays, sermons, and poetry, along with reflections by other authors. Copies, available in the church office, designate readings for each week. Times to gather for conversation are noted below. And on March 11-12, as our Briner Lecturer for this year, we will host Al Staggs, who offers a first-person portrayal of Dietrich Bonhoeffer.

In one letter from prison, Bonhoeffer wrote:

"I'm still discovering right up to this moment, that it is only by living completely in this world that one learns to have faith... ...living unreservedly in life's duties, problems, successes and failures, experiences and perplexities. In so doing we throw ourselves into the arms of God..."



## TEACHERS AT FPC

The role of our Church School teachers is to create a safe, welcoming and accepting environment in which children can enjoy learning about Christ, our church, and positive ways to model our Christian faith as they participate in and come to understand that they belong to our church family.

### Teachers are asked to

- 1. create a welcoming environment for the children.
- 2. come with a prepared lesson and activity.
- 3. engage the children with the lesson, etc..
- 4. praise the children.
- 5. help the children develop positive interactions with one another based on kindness and respect for diversity.
- 6. redirect difficult behaviors (remember, difficult behaviors are often a way for children to keep themselves safe when they feel uncomfortable).
- 7. leave the classroom in order.

## Shepherds are asked to

- 1. welcome the children.
- 2. take and record attendance.
- 3. sit with the kids and encourage participation, role model an interest in the topic.
- 4. praise and encourage the kids.
- 5. help teacher with supplies, snacks, etc. and clean up.
- 6. escort children to the bathroom.
- 7. help children with their projects, listen to, and engage in conversation with them.
- 8. assist the teacher in dismissing each child to a parent or approved guardian.

## What Shepherds do NOT have to do

- 1. come prepared with lesson or materials.
- 2. handle behavior problems; (instead, help carry out a redirection).

## Using Eco Palms ...

## **We Promote Social Justice**

- Harvesting palms is an important source of income. but gatherers usually receive a low price.
- Gatherers will receive a higher price for their "fair trade" palms improving their income.

## We Promote Environmental Stewardship

- Palms protect valuable natural forests, because they provide income to forest communities.
- Palms will be "sustainably" harvested and managed, to protect the palms and the forests they need for shade.

## Why a "Fair Trade" Palm?

- To improve income and living conditions for the communities gathering the palm.
- To protect the palms and the important forests from which they are gathered through sustainable harvest programs.

## Did You Know?.

- Palm gathering actually protects valuable natural forests.
- At least half of the farmers in the Central Peten of Guatemala earn additional income from harvesting fronds, and more than a quarter of household heads support themselves exclusively by collecting fronds.
- Each palm plant produces 2 to 5 harvestable leaves over a 2 to 4 month period.

## LIVE GREEN AND RECYCLE!

You can help save energy and reduce the strain on our landfills by recycling! Both Kalamazoo and Portage offer free curbside recycling to all residents. Here is some basic information to help you:

**KALAMAZOO:** For more complete information, go to <a href="www.kalamazoocity.org/recycling">www.kalamazoocity.org/recycling</a>. If you do not have a recycling curb cart you can go to that website, or call the city at 269-337-8215. Recycling carts are collected every two weeks on the day your trash is collected; the website has a map and schedule that show when your cart will be picked up. Wheel your cart to the curb by 6am on the day of pickup.

## Here's what you CAN recycle:

- **--Paper:** Any paper (staples are OK), newspaper, including inserts; magazines, envelopes, junk mail (!), phone books, brochures, shredded paper (in a paper bag, please), and paper bags.
- --Cardboard: file folders, poster boards, cardboard boxes (break down to fit in curb cart) but NO pizza boxes with food residue!
- **--Plastic:** all plastic labeled with recycling symbols #1-5 and #7 (not #6), water bottles, soda bottles
- --Glass: clear, green or brown bottles, and jars. No window glass.
- --Metal: aluminum beverage cans, aluminum pie tins, and food cans.

**Note:** all containers must be clean! Remove caps from bottles, place items directly in curb cart, labels are OK, and all items must fit in the curb cart. Overfull carts will not be collected.

## What you CAN'T recycle:

- --Plastic bags of any sort, no matter what symbol is on the bag.
- **--Packing foam,** Styrofoam cups, packing peanuts, and egg cartons.
- -- Toxic material containers, i.e., containers that have held a toxic material, such as motor oil.
- --Heat-resistant glassware, such as canning jars, oven-safe glassware, or glassware for hot foods and liquids
- --Paper disposables, such as paper towels, paper plates and cups, and freezer food boxes

**PORTAGE** You can get more information and order a curb cart at www.portagemi.gov/ Departments/PublicServices/CurbsideReclycingProgram.aspx. As in Kalamazoo, recycling carts are collected every two weeks, but you have a choice of a 96-gal. or 64-gal cart.

### Rules are the same as for Kalamazoo, with these exceptions:

Glass: any color accepted

**Plastics:** any rigid plastics labeled #1-7. Butter, yogurt, and deli containers are OK.
