#### **A MINUTE IN MINISTRY**

"The devil can cite Scripture for his purpose." The Merchant of Venice, Shakespeare.

The Christian church has a long and complicated history with how it has used scripture. The reality is that a lot of the stories we hold sacred are problematic — especially when they are removed from the overarching story of God's love for God's people and God's call for the people to respond with love for God and for one another.

Think for just a moment about our favorite stories from our Children's Bibles —the stories we paint on nursery walls – Noah's Ark, Jonah, Baby Moses in the basket, even our beloved Christmas story. Each of these stories has an element of violence and terror from which we would ordinarily seek to shelter our youngest children.

What are these stories about? Noah —mass genocide, perpetrated by God. Jonah a man is thrown overboard to calm the seas only to be eaten by a fish because he was afraid to go tell a nation known for its murderous ways that God was getting ready to wipe them out. Baby Moses —placed in a basket to save his life because the government has enacted a new policy that all Hebrew children should be murdered at birth to prevent them from becoming a burden on the system. The Christmas story —a young couple (betrothed, in spite of her pregnancy, which gave her fiancé every right to stone her to death) is forced to travel a great distance to be registered by the oppressive power that has colonized their land. After giving birth, they are forced to flee to another country because of an edict from the king that all the children born in that area in the past two years must be killed.

These are horrible stories! Taken at face value, and removed from the overarching story of the Bible, they are absolutely terrifying and paint a picture of a ruthless and vengeful God. But the thing is, the Noah's Ark story wasn't about the flood. It was about the saving grace of a God who gives second (and third...and fourth...) chances. Jonah wasn't about the fish. It was about a God who sends people to tell us when we're on the wrong path, and gives us the opportunity to change. Moses is the tale of a person with a very special role to fill and how God preserved him for that purpose. And, our beloved Christmas story is about the birth of a savior in the humblest of circumstances. demonstrating that God loves the whole world, not just a privileged few, in such a way that God would humble God's very self in order to show us.

We simply cannot read the Bible piecemeal – it is holy because it is whole, and it calls God's people to wholeness. We must address these stories and verses that have been (and continue to be) taken out of context to justify systems of violence, oppression and abuse of power. We must remember that the overarching story of our scriptures – what it all points back to – is God's gracious love for us, and our call to respond with love. "For the one who loves another has fulfilled the law." (Romans 13:8)

This summer, I will be leading a class (information on pg. 5) that will seek to tackle some of these difficult topics. I hope you will join me as we notice together the things in our scriptures that bother us and seek to place them within that overarching story so that we might learn what they have to say to us today. No matter what the amount may be, we therefore hope that all will feel comfortable in pledging whatever they can.

The official launch of the You Have a Place at the Table Campaign began with our fiesta, "Springing into Stewardship" on May 6. It was a wonderfully attended event. A number of generous members volunteered to help with the fall campaign. Many also agreed to provide introductions to various groups within the church to let us provide more information about our fall campaign and seek greater involvement, whether in the form of time, treasure, or talent.

As the summer progresses, we will increasingly be reaching out in various ways to ask for your support and, quite simply, your thoughts and suggestions as to how we might make the upcoming fall campaign more successful. Our next major event is "Pitch In for Stewardship," a potluck on Sunday, September 30. More details will follow as to various aspects of what we believe will be a fun and joyful stewardship campaign, where everyone has a role and a place at the table.

Adult Education Opportunity! July 8, 15, 22, and Aug 5 – After Worship Taught by Rev. Chrissy Westbury





## HOW CAN WE HELP SAVE THE BEES?

Is your lawn wearing occasional white patches of blooming clover? Good! Don't run for the weedkiller; think of how inviting that clover is to your local bees! And think of ways you can *encourage* these little flying power-houses instead of destroying one of their food sources.

Bees busily gather and transfer pollen from plant to plant as they forage, and are an indispensable "machine" for pollinating a large percentage of the fruits, vegetables, and nuts we love. But global warming has disrupted growth patterns, and common pesticides kill whole colonies of bees. <u>Bees need our help</u>! And that help doesn't really expose you to bee stings - many bees don't sting at all, and most are more than willing to ignore you as long as you're not a flower!

We can cultivate such native plants as sunflowers, wild lupine, coneflowers, milkweed, and hyssop, as well as clover! We can avoid retailers that sell products with neonicotinoid pesticides ("neonics"), or make a point of telling them <u>why</u> we choose not to shop there.

It's our world to enjoy, not destroy!
