MINUTE IN MINISTRY

"God of grace and God of glory, on thy people pour thy power; crown thine ancient church's story; bring its bud to glorious flower, Grant us wisdom, grant us courage, for the facing of this hour ... for the living of these days." (From "God of Grace and God of Glory") It's one of my favorite hymns. The organ, filling our sanctuary with the majestic tune—reverberating, at best, deep inside those who raise their voices to sing along. And what the words inspire: the grace of holy love moving through us to bring glory in the church, in our world, in the way we live each day. I say: "Amen!"

Another favorite is a quote from Irenaeus (2nd century): "The glory of God is a human being fully alive." This connects with one of my favorite times of year, when autumn arrives, weather cools, leaves turn, and it's as if the Holy Spigot (Holy Spirit ... get it?!) opens a little further to pour out God's grace among us. Sunday school. Youth group. Choirs. Adult classes and Bible studies. Fellowship and service activities. We join the church's eternal story: loving God and neighbor. We grow evermore fully alive as a new program year buds into glorious flower.

Pat, Chrissy, Cindy, teachers, and many committee members have been planning. Minds are full of possibilities. Arms full of resources. Hearts are full of joy and hope and love to share. I hope you'll join your kin in Christ on Sunday mornings and many other times throughout the week. I encourage you to contact Pat or Chrissy to get your child / youth connected. I urge us all to find a way to reconnect with groups we've been part of in the past, or something new—a meal among friends, conversation among spiritual companions, helping to construct a new home, or cutting communion bread.

The simple fact is that as we get more active and connected, we'll be more inspired, filled with gratitude and joy ... fully alive! We arrive. We give. We receive. It's a symbiotic cycle of grace. It's an infectious sharing in divine glory. We need that kind of nourishment. And others need our contribution to be fed in their own way.

As you read articles and announcements in this *Presbyter*, I hope something catches your attention, captures your interest, takes hold in your heart. So may God grant us all wisdom and courage and inspiration and peace, whatever we face in this hour, and for the living of our days.

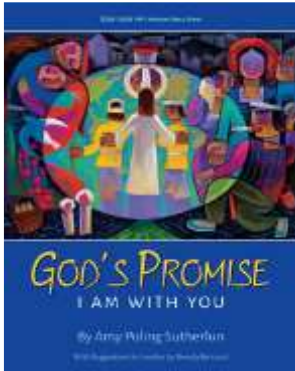
BULLETIN ANNOUNCEMENT GUIDELINES

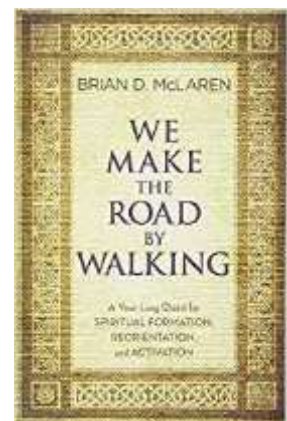

GROWING WITH SMALL GROUPS

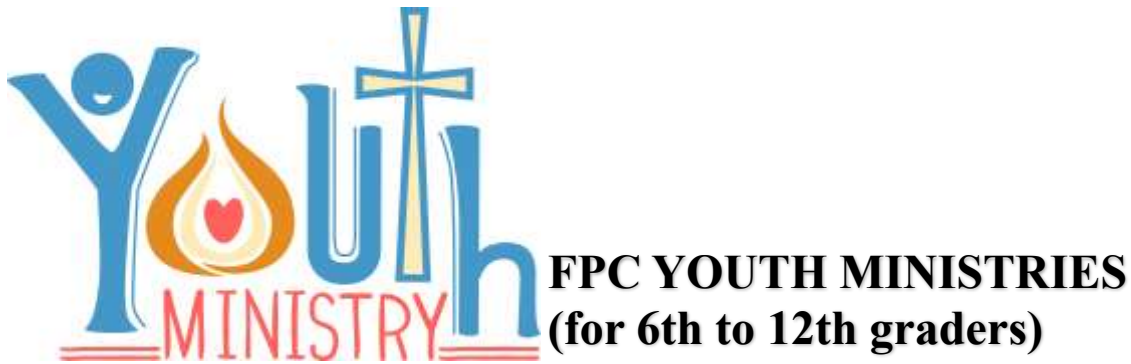

A NOTE FROM GREEN PETE : "BE MINDFUL"
