<u>MINUTE IN MINISTRY</u>

"Nothing exists without music, for the universe itself is said to have been framed by a kind of harmony of sounds, and the heaven itself revolves under the tone of that harmony." Isidore of Seville (c.560 - 636)

I am often struck by the word "harmony." It is interesting to me that harmony's multiple definitions are...well...harmonious. Harmony can refer to a pleasing combination of simultaneous musical sounds, or it can refer to agreement, peace, or fellowship. The Greek root of the word simply means "to join." The really fascinating thing about harmony – whether you are referring to music, people, or ideas – is that harmony can exist only in diversity. A chord of one note is not a chord.

When a choir sings in harmony, each part has its own note to sing. When the notes come together, they create something so much more beautiful than each could create on its own. When a note is missing from the chord, it sounds empty. We recognize this in music. We hear the complexity of a beautiful chord and enjoy what each note brings to the whole. We appreciate difference for what it can create.

And yet, when it comes to our relationships with one another, it seems we have lost this appreciation for the beauty that difference can create. We forget that we are each given a different note to play in the symphony of life. My note will often not be the same as yours, but the final composition is more beautiful because of the part we each played. Each of our notes is richer for the addition of harmony.

In the coming months, we have many opportunities to enjoy music together, over and above the usual worship music in which we participate. On November 4, our worship will be framed by the choir singing John Rutter's setting of *The Requiem*. On December 2, there will be a Jazz Worship service in the evening. On December 16, we will share in our annual Vespers service. And, of course, on Christmas Eve, we will share in the story of Christ's birth through song and scripture.

As we share in the harmonies of this season together, let us remember that we are created in the image of Harmony. The God we know best through the image of Trinity exists, fundamentally, as Harmony. And we, my friends, are the song. Our notes are different, our instruments are different, but as long as we keep our eyes on our Composer/Conductor, we can share together in the symphony of life.

STEWARDSHIP UPDATE: EVERY GIFT HELPS!

The Stewardship Campaign has commenced with our newly-designed pledge cards. The new pledge card has two sections. One section provides for financial pledges. This information is kept strictly confidential by a member of the staff, Louise Taylor. No one else, including clergy, is privy to the information. The other section relates to alternative ways in which one can meaningfully contribute. That information will be separated and its contents made known to the relevant committees, staff, and others with similar interests.

This year is particularly important in the life of our church. Significant cutbacks are currently being planned, should the shortfall of this past year not be overcome. As Chrissy wrote in an email to the congregation, "it just takes a little from each of us to make a big difference." And as Ray Wicks reminded us in his Minute for Mission, "Stewardship is about what each of us can contribute to the life and well-being of our church and community, whether it is time, talent, or financial gifts. All of these are needed to be the hands, feet, and heart of Jesus to our membership, the community, and beyond."

In her Minute for Mission, Pam Tritsch described her sense of community within our church family in recalling how "the pastoral care and congregational support was especially felt during Tim's illness and after his passing." In so doing, she reminded us of the "myriad ways to share your time and talents."

In his refrain "because of this church," Jonathon Willoughby in his Minute for Mission cited just a few of the blessings of our ministries:

- ...there are hundreds, on a weekly basis, who have had a place to come out of the cold and have a good meal;
- ...there are children in the Edison School District who receive support, supplies, and the assistance of role models;
- ...there is blood donated to those in need;
- ...there is support to those who are ill or injured or are grieving;
- ...there is beautiful music;
- ...there's a warm, comforting place for a memorial service; and
- ...there's a special place for a son or daughter to get married.

Because of this church, we all have much to be thankful for. If we all work together, much can be accomplished toward our goal of ensuring that the ministries of our church remain vibrant. We respectfully ask that you consider what you might be able to give for the support of the ministries of your church. For those who have not given regularly in the past, perhaps you will consider becoming a regular contributor. For those who have pledged in the past, we ask that you give thought to whether your gift could be increased. Every gift helps!

THE SONGS OF ADVENT

A Bible study on Luke, chapters 1 and 2

OUTREACH AND COMMUNITY SERVICE

KALAMAZOO LOAVES AND FISHES PANTRY AT MINISTRY WITH COMMUNITY

Kalamazoo's First Presbyterian Church, Westminster Presbyterian Church, North Church, and Pine Island Church work together to provide both monetary and volunteer support to <u>Kalamazoo Loaves and Fishes</u> (KLF). The churches' efforts focus on the food pantry at the newly relocated Ministry with Community facility on North Edwards Street in downtown Kalamazoo. The Kalamazoo Loaves and Fishes' mission is to feed hungry people in Kalamazoo County and to engage the community in the fight to end hunger. KLF is currently concerned with increasing requests from people for food assistance. KLF's <u>Grocery Pantry Program (GPP)</u> is their largest and longest-running program serving Kalamazoo County. At 25 pantry sites throughout the county, local residents receive same-day appointments in which they can choose four days' amount of food for each individual household member. Food is based on the USDA's MyPlate guidelines, providing nutritionally balanced choices that include protein, grains, and fruits and vegetables. During busy periods, KLF can see more than 1,000 local residents-in-need utilizing the GPP program in a single day. At Ministry with Community's food pantry for June through August 2018: 650 households were served, providing four days' worth of food to 1,127 adults and 490 children.

We at First Presbyterian, Westminster, North, and Pine Island Churches are seeking to recruit volunteers for the KLF Pantry at Ministry with Community. Our list of volunteers needs to grow, to continue to take on the challenges of running this important service. Daily, Monday through Friday, we work in teams of three — screeners, shopper helpers, and baggers — to serve the clients who come to obtain food for their families. The volunteer commitment is from 2:45 pm to 4:15 pm (this could be for one or several days during a month).

KLF is the largest charitable food distribution system in Kalamazoo County, with a total of 73 locations in the foodassistance network and a volunteer force that needs more than 400 volunteers per week. Please consider joining our effort to help feed hungry families and provide good words of encouragement. Please check your schedule, and clear some time for volunteering. The Rickman House is an assisted living facility for adults with mental illness. The monthly FPC Bingo program combines donations of household and personal care items to the residents, with live entertainment. Every month there is a need for laundry detergent, dish soap, cleaning supplies, personal care items like body wash, shampoo, soap, toothpaste, toilet paper, and pop and snacks.

The big event of the year is Christmas Bingo, where we give additional prizes, such as warm coats and bus tokens. We also have a pizza party for the residents. For Christmas Bingo gifts, the Rickman House residents have indicated that they would like items such as winter coats and accessories like gloves and hats; dish towels, bath towels, perfume, calendars, additional hair products and accessories, make-up, movies, paper towels, make-up bags, food items that can be prepared in a microwave, nail polish remover, and bus tokens. Pizza and pop are also needed.

The Rickman House Bingo team is hoping to find additional volunteers, to assist us (who are truly needed).

- 1. Use LED Lights and limit your use of Christmas lights. Put your lights on a timer so that they come on in the evening and go off at bedtime.
- Consider sending E-Cards Replace snail mail cards and letters with e-cards and e-mails to save paper and to reduce the amount of fuel used to deliver traditional mail. If you want to send traditional cards, buy cards printed on recycled paper and avoid shiny papers that cannot be recycled easily.
- 3. Give Green Gifts

Homemade gifts are often more eco-friendly – and more personal – than things purchased in stores. You can also purchase green presents, including such things as:

- Energy-saving items
- Bicycles
- Mass transit passes
- Membership in an organic farm or co-op
