I have been hearing these questions and comments almost daily in the weeks since Seth left on his sabbatical, and it makes me so grateful to be part of a community of faith. I am most grateful that I hear these questions and comments

I am most grateful that I hear these questions and comments directed, not only at me, but also toward other leaders in the church, families dealing with difficult diagnoses, people in the midst of transitions, people who are grieving, and people who are doing all they can to "juggle" life.

There is a growing segment of people who describe themselves as "spiritual, but not religious." These are people who believe in God or some sort of higher power that connects humanity and all creation. They simply don't find institutional religion to be the best place to connect with that higher power. And I totally get it. The Church has made a lot of mistakes. The Church has hurt and continues to hurt a lot of people. The Church has made people feel rejected. Some say that the Church is full of hypocrites.

I disagree. The Church is not full of hypocrites. We always have room for more! We all fall short of living out our faith sometimes. We all say things in anger or ignorance. We all leave things undone or unsaid in ways that cause harm. We all fall into the trap of failing to act on the things we say we believe. And we are all struggling to figure out how to do better.

The beauty of a community of faith is that we can struggle together. We can learn together. We can mess up together, apologize together, and find our way to forgiveness together.

The central act of our worship is a shared meal—a communion. It is a way of recognizing that wherever we come from, whatever has led us here, we have a place at the table. All are welcomed, all are loved, all are forgiven.

I know our attendance at Sunday worship will be a little lower during the summer months. I totally get that the lakes are calling, and that God can be found at the beach and in the woods, too. But, don't forget that your church is here, waiting to welcome you home whenever you walk through those big red doors. Church is important (even when the beach is calling!) because we need one other. We need to hear, and to ask:

"How are things going?"

"Are you managing okay?"

"Do you need anything?"

"You've got a lot on your plate this summer, don't you?"

"We're thinking of you!"

"You're doing a great job!"

PLEDGING: TIME AND TALENT

A year ago, the Stewardship Committee launched an initiative to broaden our recognition of those who play a meaningful role in the life of our church. Whether through time, talent, a financial pledge, or simply one's presence, in our church we firmly believe that everyone has a place at the table. We therefore made rather dramatic revisions to our pledge cards to ensure that everyone's pledge of time and talent was treated no differently than making financial pledges.

Our initial efforts met with terrific success. Of 276 pledging units, a total of 173 people pledged their time and talent. In the end, this covered 27 categories of ways in which one might contribute his or her time and talent. Also among the pledges were a few rather unique pledges outside the traditional categories that will, in time, be of wonderful use.

Like any new endeavor, this remains an evolving process offering a wealth of opportunities. Among the highlights, many signed up to pray, which may involve participating in a prayer chain. Many others signed up to provide food and desserts and may become involved in the "meal train" recently established by the Deacons.

The information has now been disseminated to the moderators and leaders of the various committees and activities of the church. Ann Johnson has kindly entered the information into the software associated with the regular operations of the church. This means that, with advance notice to Ann, lists of those who pledged their time and talent to a particular committee or activity can be rather quickly printed out with all of the pertinent contact information.

For anyone who has pledged his or her time and talent, and would like to be contacted, please do not hesitate to contact Pam Tritsch, the moderator of the Stewardship Committee, or any other member of the Stewardship Committee. Similarly, if you were overlooked in receiving a thank you note from a member of the Committee, please let us know. We seek to make it a practice for everyone who pledges to receive a personal note.

We hope and believe great progress has been and will continue to be made in the life of our church if we always remember that everyone has a place at the table. On behalf of the Stewardship Committee, we express our gratitude for those who have pledged. For those who may not have pledged for 2019, your pledge is always welcomed, whenever it is received. And for those who are unable to pledge, you are very much treasured, as you will always play a vital role in the life of this church.


ADULT EDUCATION

WORLD MISSION CORNER

An excerpt from a letter from our Mission Co-worker in West Africa, Josh Heikkila:

"Anytime I travel to the U.S. to speak about my life and work in the region, I consistently tell people how scripture comes alive in places like Ghana. Moving around the country, you can see women and children gathered at wells collecting water to carry home, fishermen in boats, on the shores of lakes, rivers, and the ocean, mending their nets after a long day on the water, women pounding their harvest with pestle and mortar, freeing seed from husk so the wind can be used to separate grain from chaff.

"The proverbs, parables, and experiences of Jesus make sense to West Africans. The way Jesus taught, fed, and healed the people around him continues to teach, feed, and heal West Africans today.

"For me, one of the most important things that happen when American Presbyterians engage with our brothers and sisters in West Africa, is the opportunity for learning. For those of us who are far removed from an agrarian and communal lifestyle, engaging with West African partners can help bring the Jesus of the Bible to life once again.

"I hope that I can encourage us to learn from one another how to be better disciples of Jesus, and that this helps us all to become a church more overflowing with Christ's light and love."

HEARING LOOP TECHNOLOGY

Exciting news—First Presbyterian Church has enhanced the listening experience for those with hearing impairment! We have joined other local churches that offer Hearing Loop technology for those with T-coil in their hearing aids. Approximately 80% of hearing aids have the T-coil technology.

Hearing loss is the third most common physical condition of aging; 20% of Americans suffer from hearing loss. This loss can negatively impact quality of life, as it prevents full participation in social activities.

The loop system consists of a wire that is looped around the listening area, and a special amplifier. The loop in our sanctuary is to be placed within the grout line of the flooring and will not be visible. The signal from the PA system is modified and circulated through this looped wire (transmitting antennae); the resulting magnetic energy field is absorbed by a small coil of wire /receiving antennae called a T-coil or telecoil located inside hearing aids and cochlear devices.

Anyone with a telecoil-compatible hearing aid can use the system without additional equipment simply by switching their existing hearing aid to the 'telecoil' position; they are then wired directly into the sound system. Intelligibility is greatly increased, because the distance between the speaker and the listener is bridged and background or environmental noise is almost eliminated; there is no distortion or echo produced by the room and the sound system. It's like wiring the microphone directly into the hearing aid. The sound is mixed and adjusted by the hearing aid to compensate for each individual's hearing loss, giving them as close to true sound reproduction as possible with an assistive device.

PASTORAL CARE AND HOSPITAL VISITATION

An important part of our ministry at First Presbyterian Church is to provide pastoral care, including hospital visits. When a church member is admitted, hospitals are no longer permitted to notify the home church. We depend on members to call the church when a family member is hospitalized or needs a pastoral call.


