20/20 Vision: Living Our Faith As a Matthew 25 Congregation

I love the turn of a new year. Something about the lights and bustle of New Year's Eve Fest, the lingering of Christmas in the air, and the air of possibility. No matter what the last year was like, the beginning of a new year brings visions of what could be. No matter the frustrations and heartbreaks of the previous twelve months, the moments of feeling stuck or helpless, the new year is, in some way, a reset button. Obviously, our problems don't disappear overnight, our difficulties don't dissolve at the midnight chime. But the new year gives us a little nudge to think about what could be different. Our church already does so many things that fall within the goals of the Matthew 25 vision – Celebrate the Vision, the literacy center, our partnerships with Ministry with Community, Loaves and Fishes, and other area agencies, the Just Sanctuary studies, creative worship, joyful fellowship, and so much more! Being a part of this vision gives us the opportunity to use the connectional resources of the PC(USA) to share what we are doing with other congregations, and to get ideas from them, as well!

I am excited to be a part of a congregation that seeks to live its faith as a sanctuary in the city —framed and guided by the words of Matthew 25.

"I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me...Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." (Matthew 25:35-36,40)

Matthew 25:31-46 calls all of us to actively engage in the world around us, so that our faith comes alive and we wake up to new possibilities. Convicted by this passage, both the 222nd and 223rd General Assemblies (2016 and 2018) exhorted the PC(USA) to act boldly and compassionately to serve people who are hungry, oppressed, imprisoned, or poor.



How the vision unites all Presbyterians

By accepting the Matthew 25 invitation, you can help our denomination to become a more relevant presence in the world. We recognize Christ's urgent call to be a church of action, where God's love, justice, and mercy shine forth and are contagious. And we rejoice in the ways which our re-energized faith can unite all Presbyterians for a common and holy purpose: our common identity to do mission.

As PC(USA) congregations identify themselves as Matthew 25 churches, the goal is to multiply this loving commitment to radical and fearless discipleship by partnering with mid-councils and congregations to help them embrace one or more of the following three focuses:

Building congregational vitality by challenging congregations and their members to deepen and energize their faith and grow as joyful leaders and disciples actively engaged with their community as they share the gospel of Jesus Christ in word and deed.

Dismantling structural racism by fearlessly applying our faith to advocate and break down the systems, practices, and thinking that underlie discrimination, bias, prejudice, and oppression of people of color.

Eradicating systemic poverty by acting on our beliefs and working to change laws, policies, plans, and structures of our society that perpetuate economic exploitation of people who are poor.

Role of the National Church

The goal of the National Church is to be a clearinghouse of resources, training materials, devotional and preaching aids, success stories, curricula, and more—everything needed to help individual churches strengthen relationships, transform, and bring alive their commitment to "serve the least of these" in their communities and around the world

OUR JOURNEY WITH GRIEF: ONWARD TOWARD MOURNING/MORNING


A Class on the Christian Experience of Grieving Sunday, January 19, 11:15 a.m. in Room 314-15

Loss, and the accompanying grief, are among the most common and painful aspects of being human. As has been often said: No one gets through life unscathed. Try as we may to control life, to keep it safe and predictable, we will know loss. The longer we live, the more losses we encounter — the deaths of loved ones; the loss of relationships, health, physical abilities, jobs, innocence, pregnancies, relevance, and many more. It is no accident that scripture describes the Messiah as "a man of sorrows, acquainted with grief" (Isaiah 53.3). Were it not so, how could we bring our losses and grief to the throne of grace trusting that they will be understood, from the inside? Too often grief is seen as something "to get over", rather than as a life-changing, transformative experience.

Join Parish Associate Larry Farris to explore some of the dynamics of loss and grief – the various kinds, the various ways they unfold over time, and how we can live through them and come to terms with them – as people of faith. Please note: this class is structured as a learning experience rather than as a support group.



The Thursday Women's Bible Study will read and discuss *Daily Feast*, a book of meditations based on the popular lectionary series, "Feasting on the Word", beginning January 9. This series of daily devotionals presents inspirational reflections for each day of the lectionary year along with a response and a prayer.

CONFIRMATION CLASS FOR 8TH GRADE THROUGH ADULTS

A confirmation class is forming for anyone interested in learning more about the foundations of what it means to be a Presbyterian. This class is for people who are already members and for those thinking of membership, for teens and adults, for 13-year-olds and 93-year-olds (plus!). - Prayer Partners a group of men and women who meet monthly to pray for the Church, members and staff of our church, for the world, and for one another. New members are always welcome.
- Prayer 101 a new class based on learning about the many types of prayer and how to incorporate prayer into our lives—(January 2020).
- Prayer Note: a story about the power of prayer in the lives of members of the congregation in the bi-monthly *Presbyter*.
- Prayer Offerings after the Worship service. Members of our Prayer Ministry will be available in the East Transept after the morning worship service to pray with those who wish to share a prayer request.

PRAYER NOTES:

I grew up in a family that attended church regularly. I learned to pray as a little child. However, as I grew older, I prayed less often. I prayed in church; I prayed at special dinners, and occasionally I was part of a group that would pray together. I didn't pray out loud myself.

When I became a parish nurse in the early 90's, my responsibilities included visiting with patients who needed prayer. I felt inadequate to pray with others. The parish nurses sought help from Pastor Brenda Biggs on how to pray. It wasn't comfortable at first, but I learned to visualize the person I was praying for in the arms of God as I prayed for and with them.

Practice has helped me. When Pat Stromsta joined our staff in 2008, she offered a Prayer 101 class and almost by chance, I joined it. I am now a member of Prayer Partners, which is a highlight of my month. Prayer has become an important part of my life and I am grateful to all my friends and mentors who have contributed to my spiritual life. It is wonderful to talk with God at any place, at any time as the Spirit moves me. I urge those who feel inadequate in their prayer life to start where they are.

Prayer is a gift that is a blessing to me. It is my desire to use this gift for and with others. Prayer gives me peace. It draws me close to God. I am hopeful that others will embrace the practice of praying, and find the peace that I have found.



TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE GUIDELINES FOR RIDES

Volunteer drivers and members of the Deacons' Transportation Committee are available to provide transportation to appointments and church activities. The committee endeavors to meet everyone's needs when possible, but at times we may not be able to accommodate requests, especially those we receive on short notice. Those in need of a ride are encouraged to provide as much notice as possible.

- We offer rides between 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. for non-emergency doctor, dentist, wellness, and other appointments and for church functions.
- Requests for transportation should be directed to the chair or other Deacons no later than 24 hours before the ride is needed, so that suitable transportation can be arranged. Riders are usually matched to drivers by location and schedule. If a rider needs to cancel an arranged ride, he/she should call the committee chair, their deacon, or the driver as soon as possible.
- Most of the time, drivers will remain in the waiting room during the appointment. However, if the parishioner requests that the driver be present during the professional appointment, the driver should use discretion. There are situations when a second person needs to be able to provide information about the parishioner's health and/or sometimes another person is needed to listen to or record instructions.
- In the case of an emergency, parishioners will be encouraged to call 911.
- Riders who have an outpatient appointment at Ascension Borgess will be instructed to schedule transportation through the Borgess Outpatient Services program.

The Committee is happy to accept volunteer drivers at any time. Interested drivers should call a member of the committee or send their contact information to the chair, Miranda Howard, at miranda.howard@wmich.edu. Some of the riders use walkers for mobility, so it's important that the driver's car be able to accommodate a folded walker.

FROM THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

"It is the policy of the Finance Committee to contract for a review of the Church's financial statements and procedures every three years. The last such review was done in 2016, so this review by independent, professional accountants will be conducted for the 2019 calendar year, as well. These are expensive professional services, and the Finance Committee, therefore, does not consider a yearly review necessary or financially feasible."

This is a part of the independent accountant's review report in 2016

Accountants' Conclusion

"Based on our review, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting."

The next review will be conducted in 2020 to cover the 2019 calendar year.

ENDOWMENT - SCHOLARSHIPS/GRANTS

There are several endowments that have been established at the First Presbyterian Church, with portions designated to be utilized for scholarships and/or grants. Each endowment is overseen by a specific committee of Session that is responsible to fulfill the intent of the endowment. Recommendations are referred to Session for approval. Listed below is a brief explanation of those containing scholarship and grant provisions.

The Ford-Neff Endowment, administered by the Outreach Committee, has a provision that provides financial assistance primarily for minority students in Presbyterian Theological Seminaries. Such student grants are to be used exclusively for tuition, textbooks, room, and board, and are to be administered by the seminary. Grants are also available for "mission"-related projects, which are to be submitted to the Outreach Committee.

The John Dunning Guild II Children and Youth Fund was established to support students 18 years of age or younger, who desire to participate in special projects as determined by the Christian Education Committee.

The John Wirt Dunning Memorial Fund was established for the purpose of providing financial assistance to individuals pursuing education beyond high school, with preference given to members of the First Presbyterian Church and to candidates for theological study.

The Edith Eicher Fund provides support to college students who have reached the sophomore level or above.

The Pond, Cain, Conner Fund provides scholarship support for students pursuing higher education, with no specific restrictions or preferences. (Christian Education/Endowment)

The Elaine Kuney Fund provides financial support to women members (over 17) of the congregation in search of personal and spiritual growth to benefit themselves and the church family. A woman is eligible to apply for a scholarship once every three years. (Congregational Life) The scholarship will not exceed \$2000 and is awarded for one year. A scholarship recipient may reapply for consideration for one additional year. Available funding, financial need and participation in church activities are part of the evaluation criteria.

Scholarship applications are available and need to be returned to the church office by **March 30**. Grant requests can be made at any time. Further questions should be directed to Pastor Chrissy.

Note: Donations to any of the Endowment Funds would be greatly appreciated and would benefit members of our congregation!

Outreach and Community Service

ARSENIO CASTELLON

On September 10, 2019, the Nicaraguan Partnership, Lake Michigan Presbytery, Nueva Guinea Pastoral Committee, CEPAD, and the people living in extreme poverty and vulnerability in the region surrounding Nueva Guinea lost a leader and caregiver. Arsenio Alvir Castellon passed away on September 10. 2019, due to heart complications from his diabetes.

Arsenio wore many "hats" in his lifetime of serving the people of his country. He founded Community Development Committees to help establish civic leadership in numerous villages, and formed Community Agricultural Promoters throughout the area to promote earth-friendly farming techniques. In 1980, a 10-year civil war broke out in Nicaragua which, like our Civil War, pitted brother against brother and resulted in 60,000 lives lost and economic devastation. Arsenio was instrumental in organizing more than 120 peace commissioners, also known as Local Promoters of Peace, in the southeast region of Nicaragua. These Peace Commissioners were key figures in massive disarmament and restoring peace in the region in 1990. Following the war, Arsenio continued to lead the Local Promoters of Peace who worked to re-establish cooperation and trust and mediate disagreements among the citizens who may have fought on opposite sides. As a result of his leadership role with the Local Promoters of Peace, he was asked to give a presentation on conflict reconciliation to leaders and members of the Presbyterian and Catholic churches in Mexico.

Arsenio served as the Regional Delegate and leader of the CEPAD office in Nueva Guinea from 1976, when it was established, to 2004, when he retired to serve his community in its government. In his role with CEPAD, his participation was vital and helped create the Partnership between the Nueva Guinea Pastoral Committee and the Lake Michigan Presbytery in 1992. CEPAD is the facilitator in this Partnership, which arranges for folks from our Presbytery and from Nueva Guinea, Nicaragua, to join together in sharing our hopes, concerns, and faith. These exchanges come about through delegation trips to Nueva Guinea and having delegates from Nueva Guinea come to our area. Additionally, Arsenio and his wife, Juana, have hosted and welcomed many of us into their home. Because of their example, our delegates may arrive as strangers to the homes of Arsenio and Juana and other host families in Nueva Guinea, but leave with a feeling of being part of a new family. Our Partnership exists today due to the insight and leadership of Arsenio in its formative years and after, until his retirement.

Arsenio accomplished all of the above and more, but his primary legacy is his unique ability to care for each person he met. His ability to bolster a person's sense of purpose and understanding in actions and words of seriousness and wit was remarkable. He was the type of person who, after being with him, you left being a better person because you had allowed him into your life.

Please take a moment in your church service to gives thanks in remembrance of Arsenio, who gave so much to the folks in the Nueva Guinea region, CEPAD, and us who have had the honor to know him.

THE FIRST CHAPTER OF THE PINE ISLAND STORY

Now that the Pine Island congregation is part of First Presbyterian Church, you may be interested in knowing about our history, which spans more than 25 years.

Our story begins in the late 1980's when the Presbytery of Lake Michigan initiated a plan to form five new churches over a ten-year period. A few years later, the Presbytery's New Church Development Committee chose Texas Township as the location for the program's second church.

In 1993, the Presbytery purchased six acres on West Q Ave. in Texas Township, across from Pretty Lake Camp. The property was intended as the future site upon which to build a church.

In the summer of 1994, a notice was sent out to Presbyterian churches in the greater Kalamazoo area, inviting all parties interested in the new church development to an October meeting at the Texas Township Hall.

Retired Rev. "Bob" Rasmussen served as our Initiating Pastor during Pine Island's formative years, and led monthly Bible studies at the Texas Township Hall as part of the "launch strategy" for the new church. Rev. Rasmussen also began calling on township residents and placing advertisements in local papers.

The Bible studies attracted a group of 12 to 15 attendees, who became the nucleus of the church's future congregation.

In July, 1995, the New Church Development Committee of the Presbytery appointed a Pastor Nominating Committee. In March of the following year, the Committee recommended that Rev. Kenn Shedenhelm be called as the Organizing Pastor of the Pine Island Fellowship. Rev. Shedenhelm accepted the call and began his ministry that summer.

The Pine Island Fellowship held its first worship service on October 20, 1996, at Kalamazoo Valley Community College.

Both Rev. "Bob" and his wife Edith played outsized roles in Pine Island, once worship services began. Bob became the Associate Pastor for us, occasionally preaching, leading Bible discussion groups, sharing his musical and faith-driven talents for many years as the choir pianist on the electronic keyboard, and playing accompaniment at all Sunday services. He also reached out to provide musical entertainment during our 5th Sunday lunches at Ministry with Community.

Together they teamed up to fill the role of unofficial Deacons in visiting the sick, serving home communions, providing rides to those in need, and anything else to bring comfort to our Pine Island family. Edith was also actively involved with the various church women's groups.

Our Pine Island story will continue in the next issue of the *Presbyter*.
