REFLECTING ON ADVENT

This week, I spent a great deal of time – probably too much – scouring the Internet for a microphone. You see, since March, the virtual services that have been coming to you via YouTube each week are simply recorded on a cell phone, with an external microphone to help with the sound. Normally, we use Seth's phone – an iPhone – because the microphone we have been using only has a cord to plug into the iPhone's proprietary lighting jack. But Seth is away on study leave this week, leaving me and my Android phone to record Worship. Last time we used my phone, the sound quality was terrible, and I wanted to avoid that this time.

The thing is, there are SO MANY microphones out there, and I have no idea how to choose what's good, what's not. I don't know what we need, what will work, what the specs for each model even mean. It's all so confusing. I just want a microphone that will filter out all the extraneous noise and focus on what's important.

Isn't that what we all need right now? Something that will filter out all the extraneous noise – the anger, the vitriol, the anxiety, the constantly ramping up rhetoric that divides us? We need something that will re-focus us on what's important.

As we approach the season of Advent and the celebration of Christmas, I would challenge us all to try to filter out the extraneous noise and focus on the message of Christmas, and the message of Christ. Our celebrations will be different this year. We will have to be creative and seek new ways of connecting, but the message is the same.

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it." *John 1:1-5*

Focus on the light of Christ in this season and reflect it into the world around you. Just as the mirrors in a telescope gather and reflect light in order to focus on the object observed, gather and focus the light of Christ in the world this season - the light that comes "to bring good news to the poor...proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." *Luke 4:18-19*

WORSHIP PLANS THROUGH ADVENT / CHRISTMAS

At its meeting in October, Session discussed at length the in-person Worship on Sunday mornings in our Sanctuary. Elders expressed varying perspectives and concerns, surely echoing the spectrum of desire and opinion of our wider congregation. Of course, it is a hard conundrum with no simple, easy resolution. We try to balance respect for individual levels of comfort and conscience with responsible communal coordination. Elders and staff have developed detailed protocol for safe gathering. And it is possible we were inclined toward and gearing up for a resumption of Sunday worship ... until the infection numbers spiked dramatically around us recently.

While we gratefully recognize that members of our church have done well with safety precautions (masks and physical distance), concern about general heightened risk and enough volunteers seemed to influence our discernment. In the end, in a closely divided vote, Session did not vote to resume Sunday Worship in the Sanctuary in November. And given the need to prepare adequately for the busy season ahead, that decision is now effective through the end of the calendar year.

We are grateful to all members who expressed perspectives. We are grateful to elders and staff who took the initiative to raise the prospect and work out possibilities. Though we are not all satisfied with the outcome of Session's vote, may we be grateful for careful and caring deliberation. And may we continue to look forward to the time when we can be together on Sundays in our Sanctuary. Session will revisit plans to begin resuming Sunday in-person Worship in January.

We celebrate worship shared at our Pine Island property, and lament that it won't continue as weather turns toward winter. In the meantime, we will continue to record for virtual worship on-line, streamed Sunday mornings. Thank you to everyone who has participated through musical gifts, Minutes for Mission, and any other way.

We will also continue to offer small prayer services in our Sanctuary on Wednesdays at noon, typically lasting 20-25 minutes. As we plan for special services in this Advent / Christmas season, we will share virtual Vespers and Christmas Eve services. Some initial detail is in this *Presbyter*. Please watch for more information as we continue to adapt and plan through weeks ahead. We will also try to consider, creatively and practically, other opportunities, such as our virtual healing services.

Of course, your thoughts and ideas are most welcome as we try to evolve responsively and meaningfully. Please contact Cindy, Michael, Chrissy, or Seth with any questions or ideas!




ShelbyNext Registration Instructions

JUST SANCTUARY

Have you heard of Just Sanctuary? Are you wondering what it is?

In 2018, a group of FPC members began to meet, following participation in the "Allies for Change: Doing Our Own Work" seminar on anti-racism. We began by reading books, discussing our own experiences, and thinking about how we might aid FPC toward social justice work, particularly in the area of anti-racism. That group continues to meet, and the number of participants has grown. In July of 2020, Just Sanctuary proposed a Statement on Addressing Systemic Racism, that was then accepted by Session. Following that action, the following Statement of Purpose was created for the group:

"Just Sanctuary supports church leadership and members to live into our Christian values, through actively confronting systemic racism in First Presbyterian Church of Kalamazoo and working toward a more just practice of our faith in our community and with our Kalamazoo neighbors."

We are unique in that we are not a standing committee of First Presbyterian Church. We are a grassroots group that grew out of a few members realizing the importance of addressing systemic racism within the church. Our activities began with discussion, which led to adult education classes on addressing issues such as systematic racism and white fragility. From this, our work led to adoption of an FPC statement against systemic racism, a retreat on strategic planning, a meeting to name our priorities, and now a focus on how to more fully engage all of First Presbyterian Church in doing the work of anti-racism.

PINE ISLAND BEEHIVE UPDATE!

Dear Members and Friends,

Today I finished preparing the bees for winter. I removed the internal feeder and installed a food ceiling inside the hive. The piles of granulated sugar serve two functions. The first is as an emergency food source. Bees move upwards inside the hive as winter progresses. The radiant heat from their cluster thaws the honey immediately above their cluster, and as they consume food, they inch their way to the top.

Instead of running into the ceiling, the bees will discover a pile of sugar to sustain them until spring. The second function of the sugar is that sugar is hygroscopic - it absorbs moisture from the air. Bees are living bodies and produce humidity through respiration. That water condenses on the ceiling of the hive and then drips back down on the bees. Bees can survive extremely cold temperatures, but they cannot survive those temperatures if they are wet. It's important to be sure that the hive is ventilated (but not drafty) and the sugar helps keep the humidity in the hive low enough that water will not drip on the bees.


Also, I installed a mouse guard onto the entrance of the hive. The guard prevents critters from also making a home in the hive. Mice can be quite destructive, and they need to be prevented from entering the hive.

Finally, I wrapped the hive in black tar paper. The paper helps keep the hive from being too drafty. Also, the black of the paper helps absorb whatever of the sun's radiant heat is available, it will help the bees modulate their temperature in the cluster and they will consume less energy to do so.

From here until spring, there is little more I can do to help them. If they are healthy, have enough food, and there are enough bees to maintain an adequatesized cluster, the weather stays cold, mostly, but also has a warm day or two that allows the bees to move sideways to other locations of food in the hive, and if spring comes without a late hard frost that kills the first blossoms of the first nectar flow, they might make it. In these days of beekeeping, it is not unusual for a beekeeper to lose 50% of the apiary, so the odds are against us, but we will restock if necessary from other survivors in the spring if this hive was not up to the hardship of a Michigan winter.

I will peek in on them when the weather is just warm enough, to make sure they have food, and to keep their entrances clear of snow and ice.

THE GIFT THAT KEEPS ON GIVING

Often we forget about the humble beginnings of many of the gifts in our lives. Since we spend most of our energy living in the present, we may not often focus on the past. In this case, the Endowment Committee would like to present a brief history and overview of the FPC Endowment Fund.

When we hear about endowments of many different sizes, it's common to think, "How did those endowments get to be worth (x dollar amount)?" The information below should help to answer that question for our church. The Endowment Fund was formed in May, 1984, from the Allen Ransom bequest of \$30K. Through generous gifts of FPC members and guests, plus the investment returns, the fund has grown quite well. As of October 29, 2020, the FPC Endowment Fund was worth \$5,123,210. (It's no small feat to grow an endowment to this size!)



The Fund is made up of two different categories: General Endowment Funds and Designated Funds. The difference between the two is that Designated Funds may be used for only a specific purpose, while General Endowment Funds may be used for a wider range of benefits, as the Committee sees fit. Roughly 80% of the funds are General Endowment Funds. The other 20% was generously donated and intended for specific purposes. For example, funds have been designated for Education, Music, and Children and Youth, to name a few such purposes.

These gifts to our church are not taken lightly; the funds are professionally managed to match the stated goals of our Endowment Fund. Maintaining a sustainable endowment is essential for the long-term financial success of our church and the impact it has on the community. We thank the members of First Presbyterian Church for the trust placed in the Endowment Committee.

MISSION CONNECTION

An excerpt from the Mission Connection from Josh Heikkila, the Mission co-worker in West Africa whom we support.

'The Canaanite woman came and knelt before Jesus saying "Lord, help me." He answered, "It's not right to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs," And she said, "Yes, Lord, but even dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master's table."

Matthew 15:21-28

At face value, though, the passage seems to tell another story. Jesus in fact *seems* taught by this woman. She points out the error of his ways, so that he recognizes God's love is for all people. But an interpretation like this conflicts with some very basic Christian tenets.

The Canaanite woman helps Jesus to know once and for all the divine perspective—that God's love for humanity goes beyond any limits of race, ethnicity, religion, gender, or age. It gives me hope to think that if Jesus could move beyond the deeply held prejudices of his culture, that in following him, we can, too.

I believe God has given us mission partnerships for a time such as this. Through them, we can help one another to recognize and move beyond the biases in our respective cultures that have prevented human flourishing. As we engage more deeply with our West Africa partners, I'm also certain that God will help us walk more faithfully in the life-affirming path of Jesus Christ.
