A Minute in Ministry

Over Christmas and New Year's, I've doing some painting. Usual holiday travel and gathering plans were Covid-altered. No where else to go. And maybe many months indoors gave Suzanne and our kids an itch for change. Out with the old color schemes upstairs! In with all-new gray walls, white trim, and most importantly, satisfied grins. And I've thought: maybe it's something like what we all wish we could do in life "old" 2020, made "new" 2021. Completely change how everything looks and how we feel about it amid it all.

You see, painting affords much time for ruminating. In my case, where we were when the house was built and where we are as a family now. Communally and congregationally – what's happened over the past year, where we are and where we're going together. Yeah, wouldn't it be great if everything changed for the better as quickly and easily as new-fallen snow trims the world beautifully with white? Covering ugly dirtiness and opening our eyes to see things in new ways. Fresh snow ... I often imagine it's like the grace of God, settling gently to make all things new.

Truth is, whenever Covid, mingled with other crises and chaos of the past year, comes to an end, life will look different. We know it's alays both better (with newness prized) and worse (with losses) grieved. Much about the future remains unknown (after Pfizer-Kalamazoo/Portage helps to save the world! Hallelujah!). Some changes will seem surface only, with substance of life together still firm. Some change will seem more substantial. If like painting projects done well, living into it all won't be blithely easy. It'll take earnest attention, careful patience, with a steady "hand" to make sure defining contours of life get respected and coated cleanly. In some places, we'll need a little touch up mercy where offending bristles strayed carelessly. Inevitably, we'll also need the grace of deeper plaster or caulking repair where cracks appeared, maybe having grown for year(s).

And still, however we try to trim our congregation and "paint the town" with goodness, I pray we'll trust and find that the solid structure of Holy Love in our life together remains secure. No surprise—recent months also afforded much time for reading. Books like Susan Beamont's *How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You're Going*. Amid other gems that articulate what I've felt, tried to organize thoughts around or to simply subconsciously recognize, Beaumont stresses crucial importance of openness and good listening. What doesn't work any more? What loss do we grieve? What cherished discoveries did we stumble into? What needs / opportunities did we not recognize before? Friends, liminal times like these months past and ahead naturally pose these questions. Stresses and anxieties often rise in us when we get confused and disoriented ... and lose attention, caring patience, steady control. Assumed expectations always need to balance with realities and open questions.

Grounded in living faith, receiving diversity as a gift, we seek to reflect Christ's light in God's world.

Continually discerning God's vision of grace and peace, we share inspirational worship, spiritual nurture, compassionate service to others, and the pursuit of justice—all to the glory of God.

That's the care-full, attentive, steady work we'll try to nurture as we move into this New Year. We began conversations among staff around questions like those above, in lieu of usual annual reviews. Then Covid spiked and we shut down again. We'll pick it up again whenever we're able. That's a core task facing elders and deacons. And I welcome similar conversation / reflection with anyone else. At least, that's how I'll try to listen in all conversations trusting the Holy Spirit of love, grace, compassion, generosity and joy will lead us together, when none of us knows exactly where we're going. We'll face more than choices about the "color of the paint and carpet." Though I'm especially pleased that the color our family chose is called "Gracious Gray." So may God paint us, dear friends.

A Lens of Love

As we try to live with God's love and grace, we wrestle with scripture. How and why did ancient peoples imagine and describe God as they did? The Cross and the Lynching Tree

"'The paradox of a crucified savior lies at the heart of the Christian story.' The cross inverts world values and power. In Jesus' cross God made 'a way out of no way.'"
—So begins James Cone, reflecting on the cross, particularly from Black experience in America. When we see the cross and the lynching tree together, and find Christ there, Cone argues, we'll share more genuine understanding of Christian identity in America, for Blacks and anyone else. Giving voice to Black victims and their communities through Christian theology, Cone hopes to start conversation that heals deep wounds and empowers all who follow Jesus in America. A fitting conversation to share during Lent!

Virtual Sunday School Continues!

The virtual Sunday School for all ages will continue this winter, as we move into the study of the New Testament, reading stories of the People Jesus Met.

How do you get to know someone and form a relationship? You meet them. Get to know them. Ask questions. Discover things about them. Talk with each other. Share stories. Wrestle with what you learn. Discern your place in the relationship, with others, and with the world. Repeat.

One of the first ways we begin to understand God's selfrevelation is to hear, engage, and wrestle with the written Word. In other words, it is through the stories of the Bible that we get to know God. It is through the stories of the things Jesus did and said that we get to know Jesus. It is through the Holy Spirit that we live and learn together. We get to know ourselves as beloved children of God and with our own place in the faith community.

Through our virtual Sunday School this winter, we will:

- read and hear stories from the Bible
- pause to let each story find its way into our hearts and minds;
- engage curiosity and imagination with the Bible story through wondering questions and activities exploring God's presence, actions, and grace in the story; and
- wrestle with how we fit into the story, what God is calling us to do, and how we might follow God's way of loving and living as disciples of Jesus Christ.

For children and youth, there will be lessons focused on people who were deeply touched and healed – in body or in soul – by Jesus. The man healed of leprosy, the woman who washed Jesus' feet, Zacchaeus, and others, will open up the ways in which an encounter with Jesus is life-changing.

Adult lessons will focus on the people with whom Jesus shared in ministry, and who carried on his work after his death and resurrection. These studies will include James, the brother of Jesus, Mary and Martha, Priscilla, Peter, and others.


