A MINUTE IN MINISTRY

It's sometimes a struggle to figure out what to write for these letters — what to say in mid-August that will be meaningful and profound throughout all of September and October. The pressure feels especially acute this year, as we enter into this new stage of the Covid pandemic, with new uncertainties about what the fall will bring. Every plan we make for fall programming seems to come with a little asterisk next to it. This is the plan* - unless things change. If there's one thing we've learned in the last year and a half, it's that our plans are fluid and we need to be ready to try things in new and different ways.

This is, of course, not true only in the church. Perhaps you are feeling that pressure, that challenge in your life as you try to make plans* for tomorrow, next week, next year – not really knowing how much you can plan, and trying to think about the what ifs.

As I was writing this, feeling a little worried about what fall will look like, how many last-minute changes of plans there might be, how we're going to plan for every eventuality, I received a text message from Meredith, asking for my opinion on the backpack tag messages we will send to the kids this fall – blessing their backpacks and the children themselves as they begin this new school year (many of them entering a classroom for the first time since March, 2020). This is the tag we chose:



This is the message this church will be sending with its children this fall, and I challenge us each to take it on as our charge. Be loved. Be kind. Be you. You are a child of God, created in the image of the God, who is love. Be that image, be that reflection of God. Serve the world and the church with kindness and compassion, knowing that you are loved. You are enough.

Scripture tells us "Do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today." (Matthew 6:34) Today's trouble is enough for today, and God's love and compassion are enough to cover us today, tomorrow, and always.

Be loved. Be kind. Be you.


IN-PERSON SUNDAY SCHOOL: FALL 2021

2022 MISSION TRIP TO NICARAGUA

The Presbytery's Nicaraguan Partnership is planning mission trip to Nicaragua in 2022. The trip will be for 8 to 10 days. You will be staying with a Nicaraguan family for about 4-6 days. We will be assembling and installing water filters in rural homes.

We will also learn about the work of CEPAD in promoting self-sufficiency, creating small patio farms and vegetable gardens for the poorest of the poor which helps them provide better nutrition for their families. This is a trip for adults, college students and teens.

The Nicaraguan Partnership with Nueva Guinea Pastoral Committee and CEPAD (Nicaraguan Council of Protestant Churches) officially started in 1994. Groups have been going to the Nueva Guinea region of Nicaragua since 1992. CEPAD provides transportation, translators, housing and meals for the delegation.

Approximately 160 members of our Presbytery from 30 different churches have traveled in delegations to Nueva Guinea. Are you ready for an international mission trip experience?

We would like to know if you are interested in joining us and also whether you would prefer to have the trip in **April**, **May or June of 2022**. In order to plan this trip, we need to know by **September 15, 2021** if you are interested and if so, which month you prefer.

HOPE GARDEN BEE COLONY

Bob Candido reported following information regarding the bees at Hope Garden:

I am please to introduce to you Queen Hope. She is the slightly longer bee with a blue dot on her back. Hope and her colony was installed at the garden community this spring and has established herself quite well. She is a prolific layer and, as you can see, her attendants dote on her as she moves throughout the hive laying eggs inside the cells of the honeycomb.

The bees are busy building up to a peak summertime population. Foraging bees will travel up to 4-5 miles in search

for flowers and other sources of pollen and nectar, while nursing bees are busy rearing new brood at home in the hive. Some of those larvae can also be seen in the picture between some cells containing orange pollen stores.

A few tips to help Queen Hope, her hive, and other hives that live nearby your own homes. If you can manage to allow native plants and weeds a space to grow in your yards, then give them a space to do so. Many of the plants we consider "weeds" are beneficial food sources for bees. Let them grow. Plants like thistle and clover are excellent bee plants. If you can't do so and want to remove them, then use your hands and avoid spraying herbicides; especially when blossoms are presents. Bees will bring these poisons back to their hives and feed tainted pollen and nectar to the developing larvae in the hive. This greatly stresses and stunts the health of the colony as these poisons, which don't readily break down in the hive, build to lethal concentrations.



If you are out at the garden, I hope you enjoy watching the honeybees help to pollinate the vegetable blossoms of the community garden.

We thank Bob for his work at maintaining our bee colony!

PINE ISLAND FUNDRAISING UPDATE

There are concept drawings of the Pine Island campus at both tower entrances of the church. Fundraising continues for the proposed multi-function structure. All contributions are greatly appreciated. We are about half-way to our goal!

Discussions continue with several possible donors. All contributions are needed and will be accepted. The ultimate goal is to have all needed funds *prior* to breaking ground. We are hopeful that the building costs will return to normal next year, after the extremely volatile year we have just gone through.



PINE ISLAND LABYRINTH

Over the past several months, a labyrinth has been created in a space on the eastern side of the mid section of the Pine Island property. Previously, a mowed path through circuits was placed in loving memory of Ben Scarff, along with a beautiful tree at the center. Due to the need to relocate the Memorial, and in answer to my desire to check that item (build a labyrinth) off my "bucket list" - this endeavor was launched. The labyrinth was a natural project for the efforts of the Building and Property Committee, the Health Ministry Committee, and the need for an outdoor contemplative space. I am pleased that Phase One of building a classic seven-circuit labyrinth has now been achieved. Bricks have been laid on top of the ground in a path, guided by mathematical measurements and reading the works of Di Williams and of Robert Ferre' (I have the resources if you are curious and would like to borrow them!). This has been a labor of love and of contemplation. I am grateful for the assistance of the Health Ministry team (Ann Ross, Heather Cloetingh, Tami Schab), and of my fellow "Elder and seeker", Janet Todd. Several others contributed input towards this project. Many philosophical lessons for me emerged from the simple procurement of those bricks (vintage from the streets of Grand Rapids and a patio in Battle Creek), the weary task of relocating those bricks to the property, and the careful measurements to assure that the labyrinth circuits would indeed allow access to those mobility-challenged, that it would align with the four points of the compass, and that it would be user friendly for walking the path, also for continued maintenance. The bricks have been laid. A contemplative walk of the circuits takes the seeker 15 - 30 minutes, and there is a bench to sit on and reflect, mid-way.

Phase Two will involve raising the soft earth upon which we tread as we walk the circuits – this will take place in the future as the project continues to unfold under the tutelage of our groundskeepers. Phase Three will include the placement of memorial benches on the periphery, a place for reflection and contemplation.

It has been a privilege to create this space – and I am grateful that Pastors Seth, Chrissy, and Kathleen, and Health Ministry Coordinator Ann Ross have given free reign to this spiritual practice. It is my hope that we will continue to learn about using contemplative practice to enhance our spiritual growth. It may be a simple practice to just walk the seven-circuit path on a pretty day, enjoying the sounds of the birds and the breezes in the fields – or the labyrinth may become for you a place to release, receive, and return to self.

It's another sign of normalization. Skip your breakfast routine and join us instead on September 19th!


NEW THURSDAY MORNING WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY



Why Racial Justice?:

Our church recently observed the first anniversary of the adoption of a statement "Addressing Systemic Racism". For those who are new to the church or who missed the statement when it was approved by Session, we offer it here as a reminder of our commitment.

ADDRESSING SYSTEMIC RACISM

In times of crisis, suffering, and hardship, the Church is called to speak both prophetically and compassionately, to comfort and heal, and to call for justice and accountability. In this time of crisis, our community and our country are struggling with a confluence of crises: pandemic, economic distress, and civil unrest. In all these things, the disparity between white society and people of color is evident.

God did not choose one people over another. Indeed, in times such as this, "there are particular problems and crises through which God calls the church to act. The church, guided by the Spirit, humbled by its own complicity and instructed by all attainable knowledge, seeks to discern the will of God and learn how to obey in these concrete situations." (1) Now is such a time and place.

"We have been slow to face the reality of systemic racism. We have been slow to acknowledge the pain of our fellow Presbyterians, of our fellow Christians, of our fellow citizens, and of those whose value has been judged by the color of their skin. We pledge to join hands and hearts with our BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and People of Color) siblings to actively confront and dismantle systemic racism in the church and in society at large, and to work for a more just, merciful, and peaceful country that allows all of God's children to flourish." (2) (3)

We who call FPC home are committed to non-violent ways to bring about justice. We stand with those who call for an end to unjust and discriminatory policies and practices, both explicit and implicit, which disproportionately affect our siblings of color.

We appeal to the leaders of our houses of worship, our cities and counties, our states and our nation to act with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love in healing our communities and in combating racism in all its forms. (4)

<u>The Kalamazoo Deacons Conference</u> (KDC) is a local Kalamazoo organization that works each day to make Kalamazoo a better place to live. KDC recognizes the physical and spiritual needs of the poor in our community and attends to these needs by sharing the love and hope of Jesus Christ.



KDC begins the day with an open invitation to spend time with the Scriptures and in prayer with the staff and those of the community who come to the building for support.

Assistance is given to those who are in need, through the DRS (Direct Response Servants), who take the time to listen and address the physical and spiritual needs of the individuals and families who come to KDC. Physical needs that are met include transportation (tokens), I.D. and birth certificates, clothing, food, personal hygiene items, household goods, furniture, and appliances. Building relationships and treating each guest with dignity are also priorities.


